School Plan Priorities

The priorities chosen for Wayoata School align closely with the provincial and divisional priorities.

Looking back at the 2022—2023 School Year

The following are the outcomes from the School Plan that guides our work across the school with students. We have reported on some of the successes our students have demonstrated in these areas this year.

By June 2023, the percentage of students at each grade level with good or very good levels of understanding in reading and writing, as indicated on the report card, will Increase at each grade level compared to June 2022.

Successes: Fall report card data indicates that 74% of students achieved good or very good levels of understanding in reading and 65% on writing. By June 2023, those percentages increased to 82% for reading and 76% on the writing.

By June 2023, the percentage of students at each grade level with good or very good levels of understanding in problem-solving, mental math and knowledge and understanding, as indicated on the report card, will increase at each grade level compared to June 2022.

Successes: 81% of students across the school demonstrated good to very good literacy skills in reading. Writing skills are lower than reading at 76% but have improved across most grades since last year. 92% of teachers reported that all students have increased their writing stamina. 75% of teachers report that all students have increased their confidence and independence in a variety of writing genres this year.

By June 2023, children will understand the global impact of sustainability in the environment.

Successes: Students and staff actively engage in recycling, reducing and reusing with purpose. We collected 12 ink cartridges, 16 eye glasses, 5 eye cases, and a 50lb box of batteries. We also repurposed about 90% of our unclaimed lost and found items to ensure that we have a well-stocked cupboard of clothing in various sizes for newcomer families, and for emergent or personal need.

By June 2023, students will demonstrate a positive sense of belonging and acceptance towards diversity (cultural, religious, ability-both physical and neurological, sexual orientations, family, etc.), both the uniqueness and similarities within our school community.

Successes: Across the school students have participated in a variety of learning opportunities to explore diversity. Students have participated in activities exploring the National Day of Truth and Reconciliation, National Indigenous History Month, Black History Month, Asian Heritage Month, Pink Shirt Day, Pride Month, Ramadan, Hannukah, Christmas around the world,

By June 2023, students will become safe and caring citizens who are committed to promoting well-being, respecting themselves, our school and community.

Successes: Students continue to be able to identify the school wide expectations of being safe, respectful, and responsible. Students understand the expectations of the school wide and classroom matrices. Students continue to be successful in the goal of making positive contributions to the classrooms and school community. Students are recognized for their efforts in the school wide bucket filling at assemblies, completing a star for the bulletin board, and in the 'Way to Go!' postcards that are mailed home. Our students continue to work hard to meet expectations in all areas.

- •Remembrance Day Service was held on November 9th. It was a heartfelt, solemn presentation whereby students of all Grades demonstrated excellent assembly behaviour. This year we had the addition of a special presentation coordinated by Mrs. Veryha and our newcomer Ukrainian students.
- •In honour of Remembrance Day... grade 1/2 students had the privilege of Peter Martin coming in to talk to them about war, peace and remembrance. He also talked about the importance of a poppy and why we wear it. We took a peaceful walk to the cenotaph at Circle Park and the students wrote poems about peace.
- •Classrooms engaged in "loose parts" activities. Simply put, "loose parts" play is a term used to define the free and creative use of building materials. This form of play is often also known as open-ended play and writing and has been found to help children practice their creativity, group social skills, and individual problem-solving skills.
