Students in 6A and 6C transformed their classrooms into a camping site one afternoon and spent it reading for pleasure while enjoying smores. Festival du Voyageur was celebrated with various activities throughout the week, including every class learning to finger weave their own (mini!) ceintures fléchées. Students participated in a two-day Musical Clinic at school at the beginning of March, and many took part in a basketball tournament between our school and another one Friday afternoon. To cap it off, every classroom participated in an educational Stardome experience at school in March where they saw and learned about so many aspects of our Universe. Not to mention all the projects they've been working hard on presenting to families at Expo Night! Feb. 23: Grade 4 Choir performed as a part of the Pink Day Assembly.


Feb. 27: Grade 8 Jazz performed at the ERP Open House for incoming grade 2, 3, 4, and 5 students.


# Festival Du Voyageur 2023








## News from the Gym

# Notice to Grade 6 Students Re Busing

Grade 6 students currently being transported by a RETSD school bus will not be eligible for free busing in Grade 7.

According to the Manitoba Education Public Schools Act Regulation (M.R. 259/2006) Grade 7 to Grade 12 students living within the city limits are not eligible for school bus transportation. Fee-for-Service may be available. If you are considering this option, please submit a Transportation Application – Fee-For-Service 2023-24 form. Forms are available from the school office or on the Transportation icon located on divisional home page at www.retsd.mb.ca.

Fee-For-Service applications must be submitted to the Transportation Department by <u>June 30th</u> of each school year. Applications received after June 30th will be reviewed on an individual basis.
