- Sale of digital versions of CMMC Year Books dating back to 1952-53.



ESD News

As ESD begins the new school year, we are thrilled to introduce and work with our new elected leaders, chosen by the clubs' teachers! We have Peace, Lisa, and Anupreet serving as co-chairs, Vy and Daniel as the secretaries, and the communication representatives Sabrina and Meer! We are all super excited to collaborate with one another and continue to bring life into both new ideas and past ongoing initiatives!

In this newsletter we will discuss the exciting projects we have lined up this year and reflect on all that we had accomplished last year!

As we look back on the past year, ESD is proud of the numerous initiatives that we have done to encourage sustainability throughout our school.

Last year, Weekly Thursday Eco Tips were introduced for the first time. These tips encouraged students to talk about small but impactful changes, like composting leaves or reducing water usage, helping to spread ESD's message of sustainability.

During November, we hosted our highly successful Sustainable Café in the tunnel. We sold Tall Grass Prairie cinnamon buns—a local favourite made with organic wheat - and homemade pumpkin spice lattes featuring pumpkins grown by our school's garden committee. The holiday season was celebrated with a Wooden Ornament Sale, where members handcrafted ornaments from sustainable birch discs using recyclable materials and creative designs. Our efforts helped spread holiday cheer while emphasizing the importance of eco-friendly practices. In February, we turned our focus to Valentine's Day. We hosted a Jewelry Sale, in an effort to promote the small business of ESD member Hannah Cachero. The pieces included rings, bracelets, and necklaces and were all sustainable and handmade.

April was the highlight of the year with our biggest event - Earth Week. Our Thrifted Fashion Show, where students modelled second-hand clothing donations in a fun and fashionable way, was a great success! This was followed by the opening of our Thrift Store, where the collected clothing was sold to students at low prices, promoting the value of reusing and recycling fashion. Alongside these events, we collaborated with Hack Club for a Hack-a-thon, encouraging students to code projects with an environmental focus. The week also included various workshops and guest speakers who shared their expertise on sustainability, inspiring our school community to take action for the planet.

Last year was an incredible journey for ESD, and we're excited to build on these successes. We look forward to another year of making a positive impact!

ESD's mission this year is to ensure that students continue to feel that they have been able to contribute to making our school and community more sustainable. After our first few club meetings, we have established a long list of creative, informational, and fun initiatives to kick off the year!

In November, we plan on making ESD's name and motivations known through our Fall Café Sale. We'll be promoting two local businesses in our community – Tall Grass Prairie and Cottage Bakery – by selling their delectable cinnamon buns. As well, we'll be encouraging students to use reusable items by offering a discount on our homemade pumpkin spice lattes if they bring in their own mug. Furthermore, by making our lattes out of pumpkins from Miles Mac's very own garden, we inspire others to grow their own food in order to reduce the purchase of imported goods.

Alongside this big fundraiser, ESD is also continuing smaller but still impactful initiatives such as our Stationery and E-Waste Collections. We have bins set up in classrooms and around the school to collect stationery and batteries so we can give students and teachers an easy way to recycle these items instead of letting them go to waste. Every few months we collect all compiled recyclables and take them to the appropriate locations and ensure they are being properly taken care of. In an effort to expand this initiative, we also plan on signing up for a Terra bin later in the year and going on community cleanups to continue reducing waste in our community.

We also plan to spread awareness about sustainability by showing movies about the environment in our school's theatre and bringing in an environmental scientist or another professional to speak about their job. Another initiative we discussed was putting on a used book sale from books collected from students and staff in our school. This would encourage others to reuse books and reduce the number of trees chopped down for paper. Additionally, we look forward to supporting more local and small businesses from our school and community this year by collaborating with them for fundraising. Most importantly, ESD has been planning many initiatives for Earth Week, some of which are repeats but we also plan on bringing new and exciting events to the table.

Overall, we're very excited to see our plans come to life during the year and hope to make a noticeable impact in our community!



Social Sciences News

Occupations of New France Inquiry Project

Ms. Street's Canadian History class completed an Inquiry project in which they had the opportunity to choose an occupation from 17th and 18th century New France and represent their learning through a method of their choice. Students built models, wrote and recorded songs, wrote biographies and created art pieces to represent occupations such as habitants, midwives, voyageurs, apothecaries amongst others.



Ms. Kaminsky and Ms. Street's grade 10 Geography students had the opportunity to get outdoors and participate in some land-based learning at Oak Hammock Marsh on Monday October 28th. The students participated in three different workshops.

In the first workshop they learned about out the Lake Winnipeg watershed, in the second one they had the opportunity to use GPS devices to participate Geocaching on the trails around the marsh and finally they had a lot of fun learning about Indigenous culture by playing some traditional indigenous games. After taking part is this field trip, they will be inquiring into environmental issues facing our school community in order to put together action projects to address these issues and promote sustainability. These projects will ultimately be entered into the province wide Caring for Our Watersheds competition where they can be selected to be funded so they can be implemented by our schools Education for Sustainable Development Club.








On September 18th, Mr. Sass and Ms. Street's Canadian History classes had the opportunity to attend the Mino-pimatisiwin - The Good Life Youth Gathering at the Canada Life Centre as part of the National Week for Truth and Reconciliation.

Students had the opportunity to experience unity and healing through Indigenous music, dance, and storytelling. This event was meant to teach students about our shared history, honour the voices of Survivors, and inspire action toward a harmonious future.

We had the opportunity to listen to speakers such as Premier Wab Kinew, Micheal Redhead Champagne, deaf actress Alequa Fox from the Marvel series Echo, as well as elders and residential school survivors. There were also performances from Indigenous artists from across the country such as Canada's Got Talent winner Rebecca Strong, the Ivan Flett Memorial Dancers, hip hop artists MacMatt and Dakota Bear and even a fashion show from Vancouver's indigenous fashion week.
