- Sale of digital versions of CMMC Year Books dating back to 1952-53.



Social Science News


Grade 9 Social Studies Field Trip – Manitoba Legislative Building


Global Issues Take Action Projects and Canadian Museum for Human Rights Field Trip


Throughout the semester Ms. Street's Global Issues class planned and implemented Take Action projects designed to make a difference in the school and the community. Former student and current NDP MLA for Radisson, Jelynn Delacruz, visited the students to hear some of their action ideas and provide feedback about their projects as well as answer questions about citizenship and the importance of youth engagement in the community. Projects included a hygiene drive for Villa Rosa, an arts event at CMMC to raise money for Sistema (an organization that provides access to music for underprivileged youth), a cultural food sale to raise money for unhoused veterans, a bake sale to raise money for the Native Addictions Council of Manitoba, a pet supply drive for a pet shelter, a bake sale to raise funds for scholarships, the formation of a youth empowerment club at CMMS, volunteering at a local food bank and a mental health/wellness campaign for students during assessment week. Additionally, the students had an opportunity to cap off the semester by visiting the Canadian Museum for Human Rights to take part in the "When Rights are Denied" program to help further their understanding of social justice issues.













ESD News

ESD has had many successful projects over the last few months. In November, our we hosted our sustainable Fall Café Sale. This sale acted as a fundraiser for our future projects including Earth Week. In order to promote buying local, the Café featured fresh cinnamon buns from two businesses in our community, Tall Grass Prairie and Cottage Bakery. We also ensured both businesses are actively incorporating sustainability into their daily activities to further encourage the support of environmentally friendly organizations. Alongside the buns, we sold pumpkin spice lattés to honour the fall season. These lattés were not only homemade by our members but the pumpkins used were homegrown in ESD's very own garden at Miles Macdonell. Furthermore, the sale promoted the use of reusable materials by offering discounted lattés to buyers who brought a reusable mug. Overall, ESD's Fall Café was a huge success and supplies sold out much quicker than anticipated. We hope this sale inspired students and staff in our school community to support local businesses by buying local, grow their own food to reduce the price and usage of imported goods, as well as to reduce, reuse, and recycle materials. Due to the popularity of the Café, we plan to hold a similar sale later this year and can't wait to use our experiences to improve upon it!

During the month of December, we hosted a special holiday card workshop, where students had the opportunity to create unique and personalized cards using sustainable and recyclable materials. In addition to the workshop, we set up gift-wrapping stations and provided a variety of snacks for everyone who attended. This event was open to the entire school community, encouraging students to embrace their creativity while also promoting the importance of sustainability during the holiday season. The event not only allowed students to learn ecofriendly habits but also provided an opportunity to engage with other students and spread holiday cheer. In conclusion, the event was a success! Many attendees expressed their appreciation for the opportunity to create something meaningful while also being environmentally conscious. Due to the positive response, we are considering holding a similar event next year, possibly expanding it to include additional supplies. We look forward to building on this experience and making our next event event bigger and better!

Also in December, ESD collaborated with LINC club, formerly known as KEY, for a special holiday bake sale on December 19th and 20th. All proceeds were donated to Sleep in Heavenly Peace Winnipeg, a non-profit organization dedicated to assembling and delivering beds to children and families in need. Their mission aligns closely with ESD's values, as they build beds using recycled and leftover wood, ensuring sustainability while making a direct impact






















Special Olympics Basketball News

Well done, team! A special thanks to Michelle, Sydney and Julia for their basketball playing skills and assistance at the tournament.










An Evening of Student Choreography
