Heading to University or College?

Check out the TIPS below!

Research universities and programs that interest you.

Gather as much information as you can so that you can make an informed decision. Research the academic programs, student life (you'll be spending A LOT of time there), and living expenses (if you're going away for school) and make sure that it is a possibility for you.

Talk to your school guidance counsellor.

They can help you figure out whether a particular university or program is a good fit for you.

Apply to multiple schools, even if you have already decided on one.

This gives you more options in case your first choice doesn't work out. Don't just assume you won't get in somewhere and miss out on opportunities.

Pay attention to deadlines.


Many universities and programs automatically consider applicants who have applied by a given date for scholarships and awards.

Research scholarships and financial aid.

There are many general scholarships as well as ones specific to certain universities and programs. You will often need reference letters for applications, please be sure to give the people you ask to write a letter for plenty of notice.

Get started now!

Application processes can be long and can require a lot of documents, and you don't want to miss out on any opportunities!



Know what to expect: High School vs. Post-Secondary

| High School | University | Tips for success |
|---|---|---|
| Attendance is taken in every class. | Professors don't typically take attendance. | Go to class. You will be expected to know the material covered whether you are there or not. |
| Five class slots, about an hour each, minimum time between classes. | Morning/afternoon/evening/Saturday classes of varying lengths (1-3 hrs). Depending on campus size and your timetable, you could have lots of time between classes or be sprinting from one to the next! | Take advantage of time between classes to study / work on assignments. Don't wait until nighttime. If you are struggling to get from one class to the next (on a big campus like the U of M) let your professor know! |
| Small classes with the same people. A lot of one on one time with teacher. | Classes of various sizes. First year classes are usually large (60-300), and the professor doesn't have a lot of time to work with each student. | Pay attention and keep up with the notes. Form a study group. Take note of concepts you don't understand and make an appointment with your professor to go over them. |
| Teachers remind you when assignments are due, collect and check work regularly, and may give extensions | Professors will not track you down or remind you when something is due. It is your responsibility to get your work in. Assignments may not be graded, but you will be expected to know the material. Extensions are rarely given. | Do the assignments. Do more than just assigned work – keep working until you understand the concepts presented. |
| Testing is frequent and covers small amounts of materials. Tests cover different units. Teachers prepare you for the test and help you get ready in time. Test dates are flexible and make up tests are given for various reasons. | Testing is usually infrequent (two or three in a term) and often covers large amounts of material. Tests are cumulative. It is up to you to organize and review the material. Test dates are set. Documentation is required for any missed tests. | Look at a term's worth of material and organize it in a way that makes sense to you. Use outlines and pictures to help you remember the material. Study often, and review your notes after every class. Form study groups (3-4 people) . This helps with studying and in case you are absent from class and need to get the material you missed. |
| You are often given reminders about what to study and when. Class time is often given to study or work on assignments | You are expected to know what materials to study and when your test dates are. You will have to study and work on assignments on your own time | For every one hour in class, expect two to three hours of studying. Figure out how to study and work effectively and find a place where you can concentrate to get your work done. |
| Mastery of a subject is usually seen as the ability to reproduce what was taught in the same form it was presented to you. | Mastery of a subject is usually seen as the ability to apply what you have learned to new situations or to solve new kinds of problems. | Aim to understand the material. Don't simply memorize it. |
| You may graduate as long as you have passed all required courses with a grade of D (50%) or higher. | You may graduate only if your grade point average (GPA) is a 2.0 (C average) or better. | Don't settle for just getting by. Be the best student you can be! |

What Do I Need To Apply For Post-Secondary?

Depending on the school and program you have selected, or what category of student you are, they may require additional documents to process your application. In most cases, the University will let you know what they need after they receive your application.

All documents must be originals. Copies or uncertified photocopies usually will not be accepted unless submitted directly by your high school. Replaceable documents submitted with an application become the property of the University and will not be returned.

In general, the following items will be required:

- ◆ An **application** (generally found and submitted online)

NOTE: You will need to make an account on the University's website.
Use an easily accessible email address as universities will contact you primarily via email.

Use your personal email and NOT YOUR SCHOOL EMAIL ADDRESS!

Be sure to save your username and password!

- ◆ **Application Fee** (usually ~ \$100-\$150 and non-refundable)

*You will need to **SELF-REPORT** your grades as part of the application process.*

You will be asked to submit expected grades (marks you believe you will have at the end of Semester 2; estimate based on similar courses in Grade 11 or based on your midterm mark) and final Grade 12 marks (marks already achieved on your report card from Semester 1).

INFORMNET: If you are taking courses from Informnet or another form of Distance Ed, you must declare this on your application.

- ◆ Proof of **English Language Proficiency** (if you were born in another country or English is not your first language)
- ◆ Proof of **Citizenship**
- ◆ Official **Academic Records (proof of graduation, final transcripts etc.):** these will be requested automatically by the U of M, U of W and USB if you apply by March 1st; for other colleges (i.e. Red River), or if you apply to U of M, U of W or USB after March 1st, you will need to request your official transcript from the office and submit on your own.
- ◆ **Manitoba Education Number (MET#)**
- you can ask your School Guidance Counsellor or even teacher for this.
- ◆ Have **all documents ready PRIOR** to applying!

Post-Secondary Terminology

Session or Term: **Fall** (September to December); **Winter** (December to April); **Spring** (May to June; courses are condensed); **Summer** (July-August; courses are condensed)

Full-Time / Part-Time: A student taking a minimum of 60% of a full course load in a Session (typically 3-5 courses per session) is considered full time. A student taking less than 60% of a full course load in a Session (1-2 courses) is considered part time.

Faculty: A division within a university comprising a number of related subject areas (i.e. the Faculty of Arts).

Program: Within a faculty; a generally defined set of courses required to obtain a specific degree, certificate or diploma (i.e. English or Biology).

Bachelor's (Undergraduate) Degree: First degree awarded by a university after three or four years of full-time study. Bachelor's degree are identified as BA (bachelor of arts), BSc (bachelor of science).

Honour's Degree: Typically completed in four years of full-time study and often focuses on a particular discipline. It provides the widest range of options should you wish to pursue postgraduate study.

Masters/Graduate/Post-Graduate Degree: A degree sought after the student has received a bachelor's degree. It involves additional, concentrated study in a particular area of interest, and may include research or the completion of a thesis. Students in graduate programs are called graduate students.

Major: The main area of study within a degree; involves intensive focus on a specific discipline.

Minor: An optional secondary area of study that can be related to or different from your major, and provides an introductory level of education about a single discipline.

Credit Hours: Students obtain credits for each successfully completed course. For example, in Manitoba, you usually attain 3 credit hours for a course completed in 1 session and 6 credit hours for a course completed over two sessions. For example, if you were taking 4 courses you would end up with 12 credit hours.

Seminar, Lab, Lecture: The different formats in which you may take classes. A seminar usually involves a discussion between a small group of students and a professor. Labs generally take place in the Sciences, but also in Music, Drama, Film, Languages and Fine Art. In labs, you are usually "doing" something, like an experiment or a project. Lectures are probably what you think of when you think of university – usually the professor stands at the front of the room and talks about a specific topic.

Prerequisites: Courses necessary to successfully complete before taking specific higher level courses.

Bursary: A non-repayable cash award to help students pay for their university education. Bursaries are awarded on the basis of financial need and/or academic achievement.

Grant: Funding provided to a student by an institution, organization or government that does not need to be repaid.

Scholarship: A non-repayable financial award to students to help finance their studies. Scholarships are awarded on the basis of outstanding academic achievement.







- Entrance averages are competitive and will be calculated using the student's 2 best courses from the approved list below, as well as the highest average of either: English (2 credits), English and Français (2 credits), Applied Math, or Pre-Cal Math
- Students must have a minimum entrance average of **70%** to apply. Note: a 70% average does not guarantee you admission as there is a maximum number of students admitted to the faculty.



Entrance Requirements

- Most programs require Grade 12 Math and English
- Each program has its own **program-specific admission requirements** that often need to be completed before or within 30 days of applying—be sure to double check what’s required BEFORE applying.



Thanks to a partnership with CNFS, there are 8 spaces reserved at the University of Ottawa for French-speaking students from provinces and territories outside of Ontario and Quebec who would like to study medicine in French. Graduates from the Université de Saint-Boniface with a bachelor's degree (typically in Science, but also in the Arts, Social Work or Business Administration) are well positioned to secure these spaces. With medicine being such a competitive field, these spaces increase students' chances of realizing their dream. Assessment is application-based and candidates are not required to write the MCAT.

CNFS also provides financial support to students for travel to Ottawa and during clinical placements with bilingual family physicians in Manitoba.



English Language Proficiency Requirements

-Applies to NEWCOMER and INTERNATIONAL Students-

If English is not your first language, you may be required by the post-secondary institutions to provide proof of English language proficiency. This could involve successfully passing and attaining a certain mark on a test such as DUOLINGO, TOEFL, IELTS, or CanTEST (fees apply). Alternatively, you may also qualify for a waiver or be from an “English Exempt Country”. Check each institution’s website for details.



Example of Waivers:

- **Three years of full-time study** in English in a Canadian high school
- **U of M:** Grade 12 English 40S with a minimum of 75%
- **U of W:** Grade 12 English 40S with a minimum grade of 70%
- **RRC:** Two Grade 12 English 40S classes with a minimum average of 75%



To Access Accommodations:

1. Register for Student Accessibility Services (online)

- the earlier the better, E.g., by May or June of the year prior to entering post-secondary
- fill in online form and identify accommodations required.
- provide required documentation.
- diagnosis remains confidential.
- NOTE: Proof of high-school accommodations (E.g., AEP) is not required, but may be helpful.

2. Meet with Student Accessibility Services-SAS

(summer of the year prior to start date)

- Will get official notification letter.
- An accommodation plan will be sent to faculty.
- Training for adaptive technology
- Accessible classroom tours



3. Provide required documentation:

—> ACCOMMODATIONS—LEARNING DISABILITY:

- Will need a **Psycho-educational assessment** that supports conclusion of a learning disability and identifies limitations.

WHERE TO ACCESS A PSYCHO-EDUCATIONAL ASSESSMENT:

Red Ladder ([Red Ladder Optimized Learning | Psychoeducational Assessment](#)), MATC, Doctor, Private Psychologist (Note: this process can take up to a year+, so it is recommended you begin the process early)

- Must be current within 5 years (**NOTE**- If Disability is long-standing and will not change, a new assessment may not be needed.)
- ADHD and Autism **do not** require a psycho-educational assessment, a Dr.'s note is sufficient.

—> ACCOMMODATIONS—MENTAL HEALTH:

- Documentation needed (E.g., Dr.'s note)
- Will be required to fill in a medical questionnaire.

—> ACCOMMODATIONS—DEAF/HARD of HEARING:

- Documentation needed (E.g., Audiogram with accommodations listed or Dr.'s note)



Supports for Students with Disabilities cont...



Funding Supports:

1. Apply for EAPD (Employability Assistance for People living with a Disability)

- Assistance with planning for and accessing supports and training for vocational goals
- May cover some disability related education expenses, transportation, equipment and supported employment
- Learning disabilities, autism, math and reading disorders, ADHD and mental health disorders (E.g. depression, eating disorders, sleep disorders, trauma, anxiety) are eligible to apply.
- Disability must be substantiated by a registered psychologist within 5 years.

2. Apply for Canada Student Grant for Students with Disabilities (CSG-D)

- fixed amount/year loan (e.g., in 2023 was \$4000/year)
- non-repayable
- funding goes towards tuition and living costs
- NOTE:- ADHD does not qualify for a Canada Student Loan Grant

3. Apply for Canada Student Grant for Services and Equipment (CSG-DSE) - if applicable

- will offset exceptional educational costs related to disability up to \$20,000 (E.g., tutoring, scribes, software, technology)
- need to provide receipts, pay back whatever portion of loan was not used
- *may be eligible to be reimbursed for a Psychoeducational Assessment (approximate cost \$3500) if the assessment identifies a Learning Disability. ADHD does not qualify for a re-imbusement.



THINKING OF GOING TO UNIVERSITY

Out of Province?

- Check admission requirements and deadlines early!
- Many universities require out-of-province students to apply earlier than local students, so don't miss out!
- Remember that on average, going to university in another province will cost students \$10,000-\$20,000 more per year. Some people wait until their Master's degree (after Bachelors Degree) to study out of province.
- If you are applying to the [University of British Columbia](#): Applicants must fill out a personal profile which outlines their community involvement.
- If you are applying to any universities in **Ontario** (including Toronto, York, Waterloo, Western Ontario, McMaster, and Laurentian):
 - ⇒ Applications must go through the Ontario Universities Application Centre ([OUAC](#)) using form number 105.
- Many math and science-based programs will require applicants to take Advanced Math Calculus in addition to Pre-Calculus Mathematics. **Check the admission requirements for your program of choice early!**
- If you are applying to any universities in **Alberta**: Many require applicants to take a 40s Global Issues or Social Studies course. Check the admission requirements for your program of choice.
- If you are applying to university in the **United States** you will need to write the [SATs](#) early in your Grade 12 year in order to meet admission deadlines. There are [SAT Prep classes](#) you can sign up for to help you prepare.



Tuition and Budgeting

Preparing a budget is always a good idea. Refer to this guidebook to help you determine how you will pay for your schooling.

Funding Sources

There are several strategies you can explore to pay for your education:

- ✓ **Personal Funds:** Your existing savings, investments, and gifts can contribute to your educational expenses.
- ✓ **Registered Savings Plans:** Check if your family is investing in a Registered Education Savings Plan (RESP) to support your education financially.
- ✓ **Employment:** Part-time and summer jobs provide an opportunity to save for your education gradually.
- ✓ **Bursaries and Scholarships:** Pursue bursaries and scholarships that you don't need to repay, giving you a head start on managing educational costs.
- ✓ **Community Organizations and Funding Programs:** Explore additional avenues such as community organizations, band funding, training, and employment services to supplement your financial resources.

Seeking out Funding Opportunities



WAYS TO PAY FOR SCHOOL

Post-secondary education can be more affordable than most students think. **There are numerous scholarships, bursaries, tuition waivers, and other sponsorship options available. However, students lose many funding opportunities because they simply do not apply!** The only way to become a successful applicant to available funding is to do your homework. Seek out available funding opportunities and apply to as many of them as possible. Also pay attention to the stated deadline dates, review what information and documentation you need, and apply early.

These three terms all mean “free money”:

- **A Bursary** is usually given to a recipient based on demonstrated financial need and satisfactory academic progress.
- **A Scholarship** is given to a recipient primarily based on merit. This may include academic achievement, volunteering, or an essay.
- **An Award** usually involves multiple criteria such as academic achievement, demonstrated financial need, and community involvement.

There are five basic sources of money for school:

- 1) **Sponsorship** (page 11) comes from an organization, such as a First Nation band, the Manitoba Metis Federation, or the Manitoba Government. Sponsorship may cover tuition, books and a living allowance, and does not have to be paid back. Some terms and conditions may apply such as maintaining certain grades and communicating course registration changes. It may vary according to student need, financial ability of the organization, and other criteria.
- 2) **Student Loans** can come from the government or a financial institution, however the loan money must be paid back. Government Loans, available through Manitoba Student Aid (page 14), no longer accrue interest while you are studying or in the “repayment” phase. This means that your loan’s principal balance is only what you owe, but you must begin paying it back six months after finishing your studies. In comparison, bank loans or lines of credit have to be paid back through a regular schedule (even before you finish studying) and often come with high interest rates.
- 3) **Internal Awards** are scholarships and bursaries that are only available to students at a particular post-secondary institution. To learn more, visit your school’s website and search financial aid and awards (page 29).
- 4) **External Awards** are awards that are available outside your post-secondary institution. These awards are specific to students, not to schools, although in some cases they will only be for students at certain schools. Look for external awards information at your financial aid office, on scholarship databases, and more.
- 5) **Part-time/summer employment:** Try and save at least 40% of each summer job paycheck towards school for the upcoming year. Open a bank account specifically for money for school and make a personal commitment not to use that money for other things. Save as much money as you can throughout the year before entering post-secondary. Once school starts, there may also be opportunities to work on campus, such as; student unions, housekeeping, catering services, teaching assistants, etc.

TIPS FOR SCHOLARSHIP SUCCESS

- **Be sure to check out the Awards and Financial Aid section of the institution of your choice's website and apply early!** Each University/College (i.e. MC College, Robertson College, etc.) generally offers their own scholarships, bursaries and awards.
- **Proofread anything you submit!** Always, always, always keep a copy of any essays or resume you submit. You can adapt them to apply for other awards. Ask to keep a virtual copy of your reference letters. If you hear back from an award, keep that letter whether you were successful or not.
- **Keep your grades up.** Many scholarships and bursaries require a minimum average of 70%. Some require an even more competitive average. The higher your grades, the higher your chances, so keep working hard!
- **Get involved.** Community and school involvement is important and it is never too late to start! Join clubs and committees, stay active in sports, lessons and activities, volunteer (see Volunteer page), work part-time (see Job Search page), organize a fundraiser-just keep busy!
- **Keep track of your involvements from Grades 9-12.** We suggest documenting this in a word document/chart which can be easily shared with your reference writers and referred to when applying to scholarships.
- **Don't reinvent the wheel.** Save your answers/essays you write for any scholarship applications. You may be able to reuse and edit these for other applications.
- **Prepare now.** Write a resume; think of who you can ask to be a reference. Prepare for common essay questions by listing your accomplishments, education and career goals, and challenges you have overcome.
- **Don't count yourself out!** Lots of money goes unclaimed every year because people haven't applied!

ETIQUETTE 101:

Asking for a Reference Letter

During your life you are going to have to ask people for letters of references, whether for a job or scholarship or university application. Here are some tips for how to get the best letter possible.

- 1. Put thought into your choice of a reference.** Ask someone who you know, and ask someone who knows you. Employers and schools read hundreds of reference letters, most of which are filled with generic praise. Specific reference letters are more likely to get noticed and appreciated.
- 2. Ask early.** If at all possible, allow two-four weeks before the letter is due; people can get busy so make sure you give them as much time as possible. A hurried letter is not likely to be as thoughtful or enthusiastic as is a considered one.
- 3. Ask in person.** You're asking for a favour from someone, not ordering pizza.
- 4. Be prepared for the person to say 'no'.** This is not the likely scenario, but there are reasons why you might get the "no." The person may be too busy to give you adequate time, or perhaps they remember you as the person who was always late, and feel that you could get a stronger letter elsewhere.
- 5. Provide them with complete, written information about yourself and what you are applying for.** (Include your grad planning sheet!)
 - >**Information about yourself** would include your name, contact information, and at least a brief summary of your activities in areas such as academics and community involvement.
 - >**Information about the job/scholarship** would include things such as criteria, the focus of the scholarship [service, academic, etc.], **the name of the person or group to whom the letter should be addressed, and the deadline.** People need this information because they take the time to shape the letters for the particular audience. A letter that might work in one context will not be strong in another, and letters addressed "to whom it might concern" are seldom effective.
- 6. Say Thank You.** After the process is over, say thank you or send a thank-you note. This acknowledges the time that person spent and also paves the way for you should you need to ask for another letter down the road.
- 7. Let them know the result of your application.** This can be done informally, through a phone call or email, but you have now piqued that persons' interest, so you don't just want to disappear.



SPONSORSHIP OPTIONS

Manitoba Economic Development Investment and Trades – Workforce Training & Employment

Workforce Training & Employment (WTE) assists eligible individuals who need training to find employment. WTE provides **support services and financial support for programs 12 to 52 week (about 12 months), or up to 2-year programs** for high demand occupations.

You may be **eligible if you fit into one of these categories:**

- Have a current or previous Employment Insurance (EI) claim
- Employed individuals who are low skilled
- In receipt of Provincial Employment and Income Assistance (EIA) benefits
- An individual who is unemployed or about to lose your job

First Nations Post-Secondary Student Support Program (Band Funding)

The Post-Secondary Student Support program aims to improve the socio-economic outcomes for First Nations by supporting First Nations in providing eligible students with funding to access education opportunities at the post-secondary level. This is consistent with the principle of First Nations control of First Nations education.

Eligible post-secondary levels include community college diploma or certificate programs, undergraduate programs, and advanced or professional degree programs.

The program is administered by a First Nations or Inuit designated organization that determines the funding and selection criteria in accordance with national guidelines. Eligible costs covered by the program may include tuition, books, travel support, and living allowances. Funding is limited and not all students may be funded. Partial funding may be provided. Applications are valid for 1 school year only.

The Congress of Aboriginal Peoples – ISET Program

The Congress of Aboriginal Peoples provides assistance and funding for training and skills development to Aboriginal Peoples living off-reserve. Priority is given to Indigenous youth, single parents, persons with disabilities, women and mature workers experiencing career change or transition. Funding may cover tuition, books/supplies, and living costs. Applications take 4-6 weeks to process.

Eligibility:

- Candidate must be Aboriginal (Non-Status, Status, Metis, or Inuit) living off-reserve
- Candidate is currently unemployed or under employed (minimum wage, limited hours, etc.)
- Status candidate has documentation showing he/she has applied to their home band, local Tribal Council, MMF, etc. for training funds, but was denied for reasons outside of the client's control

The Centre for Aboriginal Human Resource Development (CAHRD) supports Indigenous individuals in the Winnipeg area completing training that will lead to sustainable employment. Allowable costs include tuition, books and supplies, etc. but sponsorship is limited.

Eligibility:

- Applicant must be Indigenous (Status, Non-Status, Metis, Inuit) and over the age of 18
- Academic upgrading linked to skill training, vocation and/or skills training, and apprenticeship training (classroom portion). Generally, no longer than 52 weeks (about 12 months), but consideration of up to two years of high-demand occupations
- All participants must be unemployed, a registered client of CAHRD and have an open return to work action plan developed with a CAHRD case manager

To apply: New applicants must attend a CAHRD Orientation Session and complete a Level Placement Test (LPT). CAHRD Orientation Sessions are held every Tuesday at 10am and Thursday at 1pm in Room 304 - 181 Higgins Avenue, Winnipeg.

Manitoba Moon Voices – ISET Program

Manitoba Moon Voices' ISET (Indigenous Skills & Employment Training) program can provide funding support in areas such as tuition, living allowance, childcare, job starts, and other resources that can help **Indigenous women and gender diverse people** reach their employment and skills training goals.

Eligibility:

- Must be an Indigenous woman and/or gender diverse person (Status, Non-Status, Inuit & Metis) living off-reserve
- Must also be unemployed, under-employed or able to demonstrate risk of being unemployed
- Be accepted or applying to a program meeting the eligibility criteria – 1-year certificate, 2-year diploma, or final year of a degree program



Here are the **STEPS** you need to take when looking to gain sponsorship:

1. Call your community band office. If you are not already connected to your community you can simply **google your community name and band office** and call the number provided.
2. When you call, introduce yourself as a grade 12 student and say you want to speak with the **Education Counsellor** or whomever is in charge of band sponsorship. Once you are speaking with that person inform them you want to know when the deadline for the upcoming year is and how to go about getting an application.
3. Once you have the application **you can get help filling it out** from your family, counsellor, Dominique in **Our Home (Room 15)** or the Indigenous Student Recruiter from whatever school you are wanting to apply to.
4. At this time you will also need to go online and **submit and pay for your application fee** to the University or College of your choice. **Keep your receipt-even the digital copy!** Some communities will reimburse this fee so make sure to ask about this when you call to get the application sent to you.
5. Most band funding applications will ask for a student to **submit their acceptance letters** as part of the package, however most letters don't normally get sent out until the end of **May / beginning of June** – **if a student has applied before the March 1st deadline**. If your application for band sponsorship is due **BEFORE** you get your acceptance letter contact the university or colleges admission department and ask for a written letter that you can give to your band confirming that you have submitted and paid for your application and are waiting on your acceptance letter. This will usually be satisfactory.
6. **GET YOUR APPLICATION IN AS SOON AS POSSIBLE!**
If you wait until June or July to apply this does not give enough time for the admissions offices to process your application and still connect with your band office before they make their decisions regarding sponsorship. Typically (though it can differ community to community) bands will announce their decisions about who will receive funding in July.

Tuition Waiver Program

Nine colleges and Universities in Manitoba offer a limited amount of Tuition Waivers **for current and former youth-in-care**. Bursaries may cover tuition of a certificate, diploma or undergraduate program, and Tuition Waiver students who are no longer in care are eligible to apply for *Living Supports* to cover books and supplies, transportation, rent, etc.

4. Must demonstrate financial need *for UM, UW, USB, CMU & Booth UC applicants only*

RENEWAL:

1. Maintain a 2.0 GPA (Grade Level C)
2. Maintain full-time student status (at least 18 credit hours per year OR 60% course load)
3. Continue to demonstrate financial need *for UM, UW, USB, CMU & Booth UC applicants only*
4. Maintain continued contact with the college or university and Tuition Waiver Coordinator

TO APPLY:

1. Do your research and select your school/program
2. Apply directly to the school of your choice
3. Apply for a Tuition Waiver before the **March 31 deadline** (opens January 1st)

Manitoba Student Aid assists students and clients in their post-secondary journey. Whether students and clients are at the career planning stage, are currently attending a post-secondary institution, or are in the process of paying back their student loans, Manitoba Student Aid is here to help.

Are You Eligible?

Whether you are new to post-secondary education, going back to it or planning for your future, we may be able to help you pay for school.

Take this test to see if you are eligible to apply for Manitoba Student Aid.

- You are a Canadian citizen, permanent resident (landed immigrant) or protected person.
- You are a Manitoba resident.
- You will be studying at a designated school program. If you're not sure, check the designated schools and programs section or contact Manitoba Student Aid.
- If you are 22 years of age or over and applying for the first time, you can pass a credit check.

If you answered yes to all of the questions above, then you are eligible to apply for Manitoba Student Aid.

FUNDING FORMULA: cost of education + living costs - student/parent contribution, income and assets = \$

To remain eligible for Manitoba Student Aid, you must:

- Pass at least 60% of a full course load in each term at a college or university (ask your school if you're not sure what a full course load is for you)
- Pass 100% of your courses and keep your attendance above 90% if you are going to a private vocational or private training school

PROS—It's worth it to fill out an application (you can always decline/say no)

- 0% interest
- No payments while studying full-time
- 10 years to replay the loan (payments start 6 months after graduation)
- Potentially \$1000s of dollars in bursaries and grant money that you don't need to pay back

The Canada Learning Bond is money available to children and youth born in 2004 or later from low and moderate income families

HOW DO I GET IT?

- Open a no-cost Registered Education Savings Plan (RESP) at any financial institution (like a bank or credit union).
- Ask the financial institution to apply for the CLB on your behalf.

HOW MUCH IS IT?

\$500 for opening the RESP if you are eligible
+ \$100 for every year you continue to be eligible (up to the age 15)
= Maximum of \$2000 total from the Government of Canada

WHEN CAN I USE IT?

You can access this money when you enroll in full-time or part-time education or training after high school (including trades and apprenticeship programs)

GAP YEAR: Taking a Year Off....

WORK - VOLUNTEER - TRAVEL - LEARN

If you're unsure or unexcited about returning to school, a gap year may be a good option for you. A successful gap year allows you to gain life experience, learn more about yourself and what you want to do, and return to studies refreshed and ready to learn.

Gap Year Benefits

- Take a break from school
- Gain skills/ life experience
- Make friends/connections
- Explore potential careers
- Learn more about yourself
- Save and make money
- Return to studies refreshed
- Have fun

Potential Pitfalls

- Might get comfortable with a steady paycheck
- Easy to relax and potentially waste a year
- May miss out on some scholarship opportunities
- Things learned in high school may not be fresh in you memory
- Lack of motivation when the year is up

Tips for a Successful Gap Year

- **Be productive**—For a gap year to be successful, you need to put some work in. It's not just a year of vacationing and watching Netflix! Use the time to travel, join an exchange program, work, volunteer, intern, or take classes—the options are endless!
- **Apply for school**—Even if you know you are taking a year off, you should still apply for post-secondary. Many institutions will allow you to defer admissions offers and entrance scholarships. Don't miss out on potential awards!
- **Look for scholarships**—They aren't just for school! Some scholarships give students money for gap years / travel / life experiences.
- **Reflect**—Gap years are all about self-discovery. Take time to think about what's important to you and what you want from life. Buy a journal to keep track of all your thoughts.
- **Stick to your plans**—A gap year is meant to help you return to school refreshed and ready to study, but sometimes people get distracted / settled and don't return to school at all. Stick to your plans and go back after some time off—it'll be worth it.




Researching Your Future Career continued...

Once you identify a type of work that really interests you, try to get a complete picture by asking the following questions:

- What do people in this line of work do day-to-day?
- What are the usual working conditions (atmosphere, hours, etc.)?
- What are the pros and cons of this work?
- What self-management, transferable and technical skills are required?
- What type of education or training is required? What training level do most people have?
- Where is the required training offered? How long does it take to complete? How much does it cost?
- Are there additional training or educational opportunities that are not required, but may help you succeed in this job?
- Are there any special physical, legal or social requirements?
- Does this work require the use of any tools and/or technology?
- What are the future employment prospects?
- Will this type of work still be needed in 5 years?
- What are the opportunities for promotion and transfer?
- What is the typical salary range for this type of work?
Consider salaries for people beginning in the field and for more experienced workers.
- Do you have to belong to a professional association or a union to do this work?
- How can I prepare for this work now? (Courses to take, skills to develop, people to meet)
- What are some related jobs/occupations/careers?
- Can I get additional information from an interview with someone who works in this job?



Useful Job Search Tips

Everyone will be looking for a job at some point, be it for summer, a part-time job while going to school, or a full time job during a gap year. Below are a few **tips**:

- ⇒ Provide a **resume AND cover letter**; if cold calling (person doesn't know you are coming), smile, introduce yourself, and give a firm handshake.
- ⇒ Apply during **peak hiring times**—just before the summer months and just before the holiday season. January & February are typically less busy hiring times.
- ⇒ Be sure to ask people (teacher, coach, supervisor) who you think will have positive things to say about you to be your **reference** and provide up-to-date contact info for them.
- ⇒ Whatever you do, **do not get discouraged**. You will not be hired on the spot at the first job you apply for. Job searching can take time.
- ⇒ Having no luck? **Seek out help** at Youth Employment Services (www.yesmb.ca) or make an appointment with Jordyn, your Career Advisor!



We are the sum of many parts and we often neglect our pieces. True wellbeing can't be achieved unless we actively address and maintain all parts of ourselves.


