A Message from the Transportation Department

The Public Schools Act, P250-R.M. 465/88 R - Pupil Instruction, states the following:

"The school board shall ensure that at least twice in each school year each pupil is instructed in safe school bus riding practices and participates in emergency school bus evacuation drills which shall be conducted at least once during the fall term and at least once during the spring term of each school year."

The River East Transcona Transportation Department has an excellent safety record.

In maintaining this record, we carry out Bus Evacuation programs in all of our schools in the early fall and late spring of each school year.

These practice drills are carried out so that in the event of an emergency, our students can evacuate the bus as quickly and safely as possible.

The safety of our children is of the utmost importance and must be given first consideration.

Stay and Play







A Message about Play Day

AT OUR SCHOOL

They enjoyed a variety of activities such as painting the snow, pretend cooking and baking with kitchen supplies, a community walk and a park visit. They also played with snow inside the school, as it was extremely cold for a couple of days.

Grade 1 students from rooms 2, 4 and 7 had a great time winding down the week of Festival du Voyageur with group activities. Students from the 3 classes were mixed into groups and participated in Voyageur games, crafts, building snow sculptures in the front lobby, and building a voyageur camp with blankets and loose parts. Many French songs were sung around the campfire.

Students danced a jig to fiddle music, just like the voyageurs liked to do in their free time. So much fun!

Students built and tested 3D objects to failure as they evaluated the relative strength of different construction styles. Students learned how structural engineers rely on fundamental geometry to design structurally sound objects and buildings.







Students designed and tested their own streamlined rocket ships while considering factors such as air resistance, weight, materials, length, shape, and placement of their fins to see which rocket would fly the straightest and the farthest.

Celebrating Festival du Voyageur



Mr. Bender's Grade 3-4 class celebrated Festival du Voyageur by singing songs, paddling our canoe desks across the Great Lakes, reading *The Voyageurs Paddle*, and watching a great video on the Fur Trade! Finally, we capped off our learning by decorating our own special voyageur paddles. The students had a lot of fun and were very creative! HE-HO!!

Students of Springfield Heights enjoyed a few days of Polar Bear Club Recess this winter. On the days where the weather was below -27 those students who were signed up for the Polar Bear Club Recess had a choice of indoor or outdoor recess. Dressed for the weather, those that headed outdoors for recess had smiles on their faces and rosy cheeks when they came in.









Write for rights!

The Grade 4 French Immersion students in Room 25 wrote letters to the government to voice their opinion to support Indigenous students living on Indigenous communities to receive the same amount of funding for education as other Canadian students receive throughout Canada.

Students learned and discussed how less funding would be challenging and not fair. They wrote letters to voice their concern and to make a change for the better. We support the Have a Heart for First Nation children campaign and mailed our letters to our Prime Minister, Justin Trudeau.







News From the Library Learning Commons

We stuck with that plan this year and it was another great success! Our teachers do a really great job of supporting students in creating artwork and snippets of learning to post through the gym for us all to enjoy.

It is a huge team effort to pull this event off. At 3:30 pm the gym is bare and when folks start to arrive at 5:00 pm we have seating for 385 people, art and student learning displayed throughout the gym, a buffet of chilli and bannock and a full band set up!

A huge thank you goes to parent volunteers who fed us all with 26 crockpots of chilli! While we ate, we enjoyed the incredible talents of Bandaline, a Winnipeg French band. Finally, when the meal was done and entertainment delivered, we braved the extreme cold warning to enjoy a sleigh ride in the school yard.

Festival du Voyageur

Hé! Ho! All students at Springfield Heights School celebrated our local métis, francophone Festival du Voyageur with activities, weaving crafts and a concert. Choir classes sang around the "campfire" and music classes were full of fancy footwork and shouts of joy as they danced to traditional French folk songs. We built school spirit by wearing traditional voyageur costumes each day of the week. There was a sea of toques, plaid shirts and sashes. Bannock and jam were distributed to everyone in the school community to give us all a taste of voyageur cuisine. We ended the celebrations with a concert featuring TiBert le voyageur and Douzie! Staff and students were amazed by TiBert's many talents like storytelling, balancing items and juggling. Douzie dazzled everyone with a unique mix of traditional melodies on the fiddle and modern beats on his turntable. What a dance party it was – so much fun for everyone!











Safe and Inclusive School Committee

The Safe and Inclusive School Committee has had a busy winter. In RETSD, all schools use visual guidelines called "the matrix" to communicate expected behaviour. Teachers have been reviewing the Winter Matrix with all students over the past few months. All teachers have shared a visual Matrix with their students indicating what expected behaviours look like (e.g., dressing appropriately for the weather, respecting snow creations, keeping snow on the ground are all ways to show safety responsibility and respect in winter).



Students also participated in a Dolphin Tail Blitz to reinforce the positive behaviour they are showing on the playground! A "Dolphin Tail" is a ticket that students receive when they are caught doing something good or kind during recess. A "Blitz" is when students can win a school-wide reward by filling the dolphin by the gym with the dolphin tails they've received collectively for meeting expectations. The dolphin was

filled twice, earning extra time at recess for the first reward and the second reward was a school-wide movie day. Well done everyone! Every act of kindness helps to make our school a better place!





Next term, we will be highlighting the lunch matrix which supports student understanding of how to be safe, respectful, and responsible in the lunch program.

This Spring, our school is participating in International Day of Pink on Wednesday, April 12th. The committee is planning activities and a school-wide assembly to discuss why it is important to be kind and inclusive. Also, all staff and students will be invited to wear pink to school on that day.


IDEA: Ask your child what they remember about the winter matrix at ÉSHS. Ask what acts of kindness they have contributed to help make our school a better place.

Zones of Regulation©

You may hear your children talk about the zones. You may hear them talk about being in the green zone, or yellow zone or maybe they saw someone in the red zone or blue zone. They are talking about the Zones of Regulation. The Zones of Regulation© Curriculum was designed by Leah Kuypers, a licensed occupational therapist. The Zones of Regulation lessons and activities help students gain skills in the area of self-regulation. Self-regulation may also be identified as self-control, self-management, and impulse control. It is defined as the best state of alertness of the body and emotions for the specific situation. The state of alertness expected during recess, would not be expected in the library. Children learn to recognize the zone they are in and specific strategies to change or stay in the zone they are in. Children also develop an increased vocabulary of emotional terms as well as skill in reading other people's facial expressions. They will learn to see how others see and react to their behaviour. They will gain insight into events that trigger their behaviour. They will learn calming and alerting strategies, as well as problem-solving skills.

Parents can help students practice their Zones of Regulation© skills outside of school. The following are strategies that parents can use to support children learning about the Zones of Regulation©:

- use the language and talk about the concepts of The Zones as they apply to you in a variety of environments. Make comments aloud so your child understands it is natural that we all experience the different zones and use strategies to control (or regulate) ourselves. For example, "This is really frustrating me and making me go into the Yellow Zone. I need to use a tool to calm down. I will take some deep breaths."
- Help your child gain awareness of his or her zones and feelings by pointing out your observations.
- Validate what zone your child is in and help them brainstorm expected ways to self-regulate so their behaviour is expected for the context.
- Share with your child how his or her behaviour is affecting the zone you are in and how you feel.
- Help your child become comfortable using the language to communicate his or her feelings and needs by encouraging the student to share his or her zone with you.
- Show interest in learning about your child's triggers and zones tools. Ask your child if he or she wants reminders to use these tools and how you should present these reminders.
- Make sure to positively reinforce your child for recognizing their zone and managing their behaviours while in it, rather than only pointing out when they are demonstrating unexpected behaviours while in a zone.



Taking Care of the Earth and Others

We have set up a recycling center in the front lobby of the school. Through our recycling of the items listed below, we hope to be able to bring an awareness to our students of helping others by recycling and reusing items instead of disposing of them in the landfill. As well, we will highlight the importance of taking responsibility for recycling items that are important in the lives of our students, writing instruments and batteries. Students and families can bring items to school and deposit them in the recycling center. All recycling items will be collected throughout the year. As the buckets fill up, students will be involved in organizing items for distribution to organizations.

Eyeglasses



Don't throw away someone's chance for a clearer tomorrow! Donate your eyeglasses today! We will be collecting used eyeglasses which will be

distributed to children and adults in developing countries. By 2017, this national organization had distributed 4,750,000 pairs of eyeglasses worldwide.



Hygiene Products

Individual packaged hygiene products will be distributed to local shelters or used in hampers.









Batteries

With the support of the Call 2 Recycle program, we are able to collect consumer dry cell batteries weighing 5 kg or less for recycling, this includes:

- Alkaline batteries (AA, AAA, etc.)
- Lithium ion (Li-ion) batteries
- Lithium primary batteries
- Nickel cadmium (Ni-Cd) batteries
- Nickel metal hydride batteries (Ni-MH)
- Nickel zinc batteries (Ni-Zn)
- Small Sealed Lead Acid (SLA) batteries
- Lithium ion (Li-ion) batteries for
 - o electric bike
 - o electric scooters
 - o electric skateboards weighing 5 kg or less









Writing Instruments and Ink Cartridges

With the support of Staples, we will collect used ink cartridges and writing utensils including, pens, sharpeis, highlighters, markers etc. These items will be dropped off at Staples to be recycled.





Metal Tabs

Tabs from beverage containers such as pop cans, juice cans or other items such as fruit cans, pet food cans, etc. will be donated to the Tabs for Wheelchairs program.

You can also take tabs, cans or metal of any kind and size (appliances etc.) to **Western Scrap Metals Inc.** at

18 Sutherland Ave. Inform them that the value of what you bring is to go to Tabs for Wheelchairs to credit their account.



More about the Tabs for Wheelchairs Program

This is the 25th anniversary of the Tabs for Wheelchairs program. Since 1998, 52 specialized wheelchairs have been presented to children. Most of the recipients who have received their specialized wheelchairs up to this year were chosen by the Rehabilitation Centre for Children or the Society of Manitobans with Disabilities (now called Manitoba Possible). Over 170 schools and 268 companies as well as hundreds of individuals are saving tabs.

Tab Math

There are approximately 1500 tabs in a pound.

To purchase a \$6000 wheelchair, the organization needs:
approximately 14 million tabs which equals to about 9500 lbs.

To purchase a \$10,000 wheelchair, the organization needs:
approximately 24 million tabs which equals to about 16,000 lbs.

Recipients Waiting for Wheelchairs in 2023



Bernard will be 17 years old this summer and is in Grade 12. He plays wheelchair basketball for Team Manitoba within the Manitoba Wheelchair Sport Association. He has also competed with the Men's U23 National Team — Wheelchair Basketball Canada. His interests are, of course, basketball, music, Japanese cartoons, and fashion. Bernard has already played for the World Juniors and World Nationals. He is one of the youngest that has ever played for these teams. His immediate future plans, after graduation in 2023, will be to travel and compete on the Senior Men's Team with Team Canada. We will be so proud to be able to present him with not just a sport wheelchair, but a Top End Pro custom-built basketball wheelchair designed for athletes.



Hayden is 15 years old and is in Grade 10. Hayden is known for his smile, sense of humour and very kind heart. He has a younger sister whom he simply adores and loves to go to her hockey games to watch her play. When he is not getting his hair styled, he is busy online gaming with his friends, or spending the day outdoors quadding with his family. Presently, Hayden has a power wheelchair, but has a great need for a manual one. A manual one will allow him to continue to work on his fine motor skills by navigating around his house and going to places that are not power wheelchair (200-300 lbs.) friendly. It will be our pleasure to give him an ultralight manual wheelchair!


