

### **Exploring the Wonders of Nature: Kindergarten Classes Visit Children's Museum**

We are thrilled to share the exciting adventure our kindergarten classes embarked on last month as we visited the Children's Museum. 
# Greetings from Ms. Sherby's \*\* Class!


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

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






## From the students in Room 3!

### Hello! Bonjour!

We have been doing lots of learning and we wanted to share two art projects with you. The first one we made after reading the book called "We are Water Protectors". It is written by Carole Lindstrom and illustrated by Michaela Goade. We used special water colour paper and liquid water colour paints to try to make our own artworks look like the beautiful illustrations in this book. We wrote about different ways that we could protect our planet and the Earth's water and attached our writing about these strategies to our paintings. We worked with the other grade one classes to make a treaty with the Earth. In the treaty we promised lots of things that we can do to help and to take care of our planet.





We have also been learning about Indigenous culture and the Seven Teachings. Each teaching is something that is important to practice in our lives. Each teaching is carried and taught by a different animal. The Eagle represents the teaching of Love, the Turtle represents Truth, the Bison represents Respect, the Beaver represents Wisdom, the Bear represents Courage, the Sabe represents Honesty, and the Wolf represents Humility. We made artworks using plasticine like the famous illustrator Barbara Reid. We each chose one of the teachings that was special to us and made our clay artwork to show that teaching. It was tricky to try and make the clay not too thick but we worked hard and did our best. We used toothpicks and pencils to help us add details to our plasticine pictures. If you would like to learn more about the Seven Teachings you can check out our school library. We are very lucky to have a whole set of books that can teach you about the Seven Teachings in our library. We think they are super interesting and we hope you do too!

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


## Room 15! Scheelar & Carle

It has been an exciting month in April in room 15. We started off by going to The Manitoba Museum to learn about Egypt and Forces that attract and repel. We learned lots about Ancient Egypt and how their life was different from our life. We learned about paper called papyrus and hieroglyphics and about mummification. We had so much fun mummifying our own carrots and then making a sarcophagus for our carrot. We learned so much about forces that attract and repel. We learned how magnets work and how static electricity works. We also had a chance to participate in a demonstration of how gravity works and what happens when you drop a heavy book at the same time as a piece of paper. Did you know that the book will fall faster than the paper? We were surprised to learn that if you drop the paper on top of the heavy book then they will fall at the same speed.

Our class has also planted a small vegetable garden in Mrs. Verhaeghe's classroom, and we will be recording observations each week. We are very thankful to Mrs. Verhaeghe for allowing this opportunity for our classroom. Students had so much fun enjoying an earth day escape room activity which they completed as a class. We also had the opportunity to participate in a hands-on experience called Seed Survivor. We planted seeds, hunted for fossils, and learned so much about what plants need to grow and thrive.



But before we do send our learners on to bigger and better things, we do have some exciting and intriguing learning to do to get them ready for Grade 6.



The workshop takes place for an hour on Day 3 of the school day cycle from February to April. This opportunity was designed for students who identify as Indigenous. Ms. Doell shares songs, teachings and how to play and care for our Indigenous drums. Neil Campbell has seven drums which were made a number of years ago. Moving forward, we hope to be able to make more drums to use in our music program. It is our sincere hope that this program can continue and grow to include more children, so they are able to learn more of their culture and languages.



# The Well-Being Committee:

With Earth Day being in April, the Wellbeing Committee planned an Earth Day Every Day Blitz this month. We had stu-

dents focus on being responsible and respectful in our school environment, inside and outside. This meant students paid extra attention to keeping their everyday school environments clean. Teachers did 'How did we do?' checks which included checking student's personal spaces such as desks, chairs, shoes, backpacks, jackets, and so on to ensure students were caring for their space and belongings by cleaning up after themselves.

Checks also included placing appropriate items in garbage and recycling bins, as well as school community clean up by keeping the school hallways and our outdoors space clean of garbage. Our student leadership team also participated by doing random class, hallway, bathroom and recess equipment checks. The purpose was to keep students 'on their toes' by creating habits of staying tidy and not 'sweeping the dirt under the rug' before a check was done.

The Earth Day Every Day Blitz encouraged students to find fun facts about Earth, the environment, water, air, land, plants, animals, re-


Classes who were clean received a bonus sticker/stamp.

# Literacy Committee

## Celebrating Indigenous Teachings and World View through Literacy

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This year one of the priorities of our literacy committee has been to engage students in literacy activities that not only have indigenous teachings, but an indigenous world view. It has been both enriching and part of our journey on the path to reconciliation.

One of the ways that we have been working on this is to introduce students to children's literature that reflects indigenous cultures and perspectives and to create meaningful literacy activities in connection to these books. We are hoping to enable students to learn about their connection to the land and to its first peoples. We want to help students acknowledge that we must learn and work together to take care of each other and the land that we share.

At the beginning of the year, our focus was on Treaty education, Truth and Reconciliation and Orange Shirt Day. In the second term, our entire staff was part of a division wide professional learning day in which we were able to hear Nigaan Sinclair and Cowessess Chief Cadmus Delorme speak as well as engage in a session with our divisional Indigenous Education and Perspectives Consultant, Leanne Smith. Teachers at Neil Campbell were also given some time to plan writing activities connected to some of the many indigenous books that we have in our school library. In the third term we will be displaying some of our best writing on a school wide bulletin board called the "Wow Wall." We will also be engaging our classrooms in celebrating indigenous culture and accomplishments connected to National Indigenous History Month and National Indigenous People's Day.

In celebrating indigenous books for kids, we embark on a journey of discovery, learning, and respect. Each page turned is an opportunity to build bridges, fostering a future generation that embraces the richness of our collective heritage.





# Numeracy Committee

The numeracy team challenged students in every grade at Neil Campbell to use their math skills to solve open-ended problems. Classes chose between 5 problems and worked together to come up with their answers. Students discovered that these questions had more than one possible answer. It was interesting to watch how younger students solved the problem versus how older ones did it.

# School Resource Officers



The presence of school resource officers (SROs) in our schools serves the crucial purpose of fostering positive relationships among students, staff, the surrounding community, and the Winnipeg Police Service (WPS).

Unlike the general patrol unit of the WPS, these officers become part of the school team and are there to help all students see them as another support person.

### Roles

The dedicated availability of SROs during the school week provides the opportunity for building trust between students and the SRO. It ensures they can actively engage with students and staff,

participate in communitybuilding initiatives, and support any emerging situations. This specialized focus helps establish a more tailored and positive approach to the unique needs of educational environments.

During the school year, SROs report some of their duties as being: mentorship to students; mediation between students who may be involved in a conflict; meetings with students, parents, and school staff; attending school assemblies and special events; recess activities and intramurals; and classroom presentations on personal safety, online safety, drug awareness, and safe and legal driving practices.
