
Have you tried Pay Pal?

Indigenous Club




Congratulations to Michael McCall for winning a Manitoba Indigenous Youth Achievement Award in the category of Artistic Visual.

The Awards Ceremony is taking place virtually on March 8, 2022, from 6:00 – 7:30 p.m. Please visit: www.miyaa.ca


The Youth Aid Society

Y.A.S.' Galentine's Day Drive for Women's Health





Social Sciences Department

Social Sciences Department Highlights

As we come to the close of the first semester our department has been looking at finding creative ways to interact virtually with the larger community since we are still not able to go on field trips, attend conferences or put on school wide events. Here is a look at some of the unique thing our students have been taking part in over the past couple of months:

Virtual Ethics Bowl

On Friday February 25th we will be sending a team of 7 students to participate in 8th Annual Manitoba Regional Ethics Bowl. This event, put on by The Manitoba Association for Rights and Liberties, the Canadian Commission for UNESCO, the Canadian Museum for Human Rights, the Manitoba Department of Education and the University of Manitoba Centre for Professional and Applied Ethics, will be held virtually this year. Our team is coached by Ms. Street and consists of grade 12 students Evelyn Creed, Josef Boycaya, Treya Williams and AV Ronquillo and grade 11 students Khava Amir, Grace Wall and Zoe Judson. The winning team at the regional event will then move on to compete the in the national event in April. An Ethics Bowl is a collaborative yet competitive event in which teams analyze a series of wide-ranging ethical dilemmas. Judges rate responses according to the quality of a team's reasoning and how well team members: organize and present their case; attend to and analyze the morally relevant features of the case; anticipate and pre-emptively respond to commentary and questions. The Ethics Bowl allows for deeper critical thinking by examining Canadian and international issues as they unfold, while always looking for the best solution possible. Students who have participated say they love the format because of the respectful discussion on difficult issues and many of them have stated it has encouraged them to be more open to ideas.

Black History Month

The Social Studies Department worked with the student lead Black History Month Committee to prepare lessons and activities for students to take part in to deepen their learning regarding the important contributions that Black Canadians have made to society throughout history. Each student cohort has been provided the opportunity to learn about the significance of Black History month and then research and create a presentation on an important Black Canadian.

Geography

Since the start of the semester, Ms. Da Cunha's Grade 10 Geography PB class has been examining the importance of maps and being able to locate places. Students have been learning how to use a variety of maps for different purposes. Coming up at the end of February, the class is going to explore how maps are created through building a community map on the computer program ArcGIS to help them connect their own sense of identity to the community around them and reflect on how it helped them develop their individuality.

ESD News (Education for Sustainable Development)

The Miles Macdonell Social Sciences Department and the student ESD group (Education for Sustainable Development) student and staff groups have had a busy past couple of months promoting citizenship, stewardship, and sustainability in the school. Here are some of the highlights of what the group has been working on so far this year:

Battery and Electronics Recycling Initiatives

ESD has launched an e-waste and battery recycling depot in the school. Staff and students can bring these items to the boxes located outside of the cafeteria at any time.

Sustainable Valentines

The ESD student group created eco-friendly Valentines made from recycled paper and re-usable items that students had the opportunity to purchase and customize. The cards came with a fair-trade chocolate and were delivered to students on Valentine's Day. Creating the cards was a lot of fun and provided a great opportunity for our ESD students to display their creativity. This initiative proved to be super popular with over 50 cards ordered!

Little Free Library

The student ESD committee will be working with our teacher librarian, Ms. Card, to establish a little free library for CMMC students to access. The goal of this initiative will be to both encourage literacy and to encourage sustainable living.

Earth Day

Save the date- on Friday April 22nd we will be hosting our sixth annual Earth Day at MMC. Our ESD committee is planning a hybrid virtual and in-person event which will enable students to engage with several leaders and organizations in the environmental community. Leading presenters from the field will be speaking to students and there will be a variety of workshops available for classes to take part in.

Future Outdoor Learning Space

Our student ESD committee and staff ESD Learning and Leading team are working with the school IAA (Indigenous Academic Achievement) group to plan an outdoor learning and garden space in the area behind the library. We have secured \$8000 in funding from the national Depave Paradise Project and will be looking for sponsors, donations, and volunteers for the project as work gets underway in the spring. Depave Paradise is a project of Green Communities Canada whose goal is to engage volunteers and neighbourhoods to remove pavement and planting gardens filled with native species in its place.

Ms. McCrindle's Grade 10 PB Science class participated in the Caring for our Watersheds program in semester 1. The Caring for our Watersheds program invites students from Grades 7-12 to propose ideas on how they can help their watersheds. The primary goal is to encourage youth to initiate a call to action. Amanda Benson from Ducks Unlimited Canada visited our class virtually to speak to students about the importance of wetland conservation and ways students can improve their watershed. Since the program began, dozens of projects have been implemented in the Lake

Winnipeg Watershed, from simple environmental projects in the classroom to community-wide events. Tens of thousands of dollars are available as prizes for the students, for the schools, as well as to implement the action projects. Some examples from Ms. McCrindle's class's proposals included reducing single use plastics, providing alternatives for hygiene products, and hosting workshops to make recycled metal jewelry to reduce the impact of mining. Projects have been submitted and we are awaiting to see if we have any winners!

New Books



Students taking Japanese at College Miles Macdonell were treated to "Nengajo" (traditional Japanese New Year's cards) this month. The cards were sent by students studying English from Toho High School in Nagoya, Japan. As part of a free culture exchange program offered every year, students from schools teaching Japanese in Canada connect with schools in Japan to support intercultural connections.

The pen pals wrote back and forth during the year in their learned language. Many also connected via social media, following their new friends in a 21st century way! However, despite being a lot slower (letters took over a month to receive), traditional pen and paper letters (and drawings) continue to hold special value as a souvenir from a foreign land.

Many Japanese universities have generously subsidized programs allowing students to earn degrees in English paired with a language study program.

DELF exams (Diplôme d'études en langue française)

Also in November, we had a very large cohort of students who took both the voluntary DELF B1 and B2 exams with success!

Diplomas have just arrived from France and will be distributed to our participating students!

The diplomas are a life-time recognition of their French language capabilities. The B1 diploma proves the language level needed to become a citizen in a Francophone country, and the B2 level gives the qualifications needed to study at a French university.

34% of Canadian students in grades 7-12 have tried vaping products, and youth aged 15-19 have the highest rates of trying vaping in Canada.

Vaping has become one of the most popular forms of substance abuse and it has particular appeal to youth. Originally it was promoted as a smoking cessation tool; however now due to its appeal to youth, many youth who have never smoked before have starting vaping.

Youth will vape either nicotine or cannabis. Vaping eliminates the typical smell of nicotine or cannabis, the smell will be pleasant.

Vaping is the act of inhaling and exhaling chemicals that have been heated in a device to produce an aerosol.

The vaping device comes in all shapes and sizes. Originally they looked like cigarettes or pipes but the devices are constantly evolving and offer users different options in terms of the temperature they can heat the chemical to, size, and ability to be recharged (by plugging into a USB port) or be disposable.

The current most popular vapes are very discreet and look like USB sticks, lipstick or other common household items. Larger "mod" devices are also still commonly used.

The most common chemicals used in vape juice are:

- glycerol
- flavours

- propylene glycol
- nicotine or cannabis

The heating process can also cause reactions that cause additional chemicals to be produced like as formaldehyde.

The long term effects of vaping are still unknown. We do know that exposure to nicotine during adolescence can affect memory, concentration, impulse control as well as cognitive and behavioral problems. We also know that cannabis has the greatest negative health consequences on youth as their brains are still developing. They tend to struggle with memory and concentration and are at increased risk for depression, anxiety and psychosis.

The other component that is very important to note is that there are significant risks to inhaling chemicals into the lungs.

Remember, you don't need to be an expert on substance use to talk to your youth about vaping! Start the conversation, listen to what they are saying and provide information and resources to aid them in decision making.
