Ecole Neil Campbell 2019-2020 Report to the Community

Mission Statement

At Ecole Neil Campbell School we believe in the value of lifelong learning, the pursuit of excellence and the development of citizenship in a caring environment.

About Ecole Neil Campbell School

- We are a K-5 English school in the River East Transcona School Division. As of June 2020, we have a total of 335 students.
- Our school name has officially been changed to Ecole Neil Campbell School replacing the former Neil Campbell School name.
- Our school was built in 1957. It continues to maintain strong community links with an active Parent Council.
- Neil Campbell School provides English Language and French Immersion programming, Basic French, and specialists in Music, Physical Education, Library, Resource and Guidance. We maintain a strong Reading Recovery and Early Numeracy Program.
- We also have access to RETSD clinicians (psychology, social work, occupational therapy, physiotherapy and speech and language) as well as behavior and reading specialists.
- Our school instills community values. We believe in "Being Safe, Respectful and Responsible".

2019-2020 Priorities

Literacy -

By June 2020, 90% of Ecole Neil Campbell School students will demonstrate a one-year growth in their reading and writing including students with identified cognitive disabilities and self-identified indigenous populations.

Successes:

- Student's reading was assessed throughout the school year for data collection as well as to guide ongoing instruction. 82% of students received a 3 or 4 on the third term report card in reading.
- Students participated in one on demand writes. (Regie Routman writing assessment) and second was not completed in the spring due to class suspension. 75% of students received a 3 or 4 on their third term report card.
- Student writing was celebrated on the bulletin boards around the building.
- Student writing was shared and celebrated at staff meetings and during PD sessions.
- There is writing and Optimal Learning Model evidence in the classrooms and hallways to support reading and writing connection.
- Quality literature continues to be added to our library and classrooms.

- As part of the OLM work; classroom libraries were sorted, and description of audience and purpose were displayed on all bulletin boards in the hallways.
- Literacy support worker was hired to teach small reading groups each morning (Support was also provided via TEAMs during the suspension of classes

By June 2020, 100% of French Immersion students will increase the frequency that they engage in French speaking in the classroom and during French extra-curricular activities. Students will be expected to speak French 80% of the time in the classroom.

Successes:

- Several French clubs were offered to students during non-instructional time.
- Some classrooms developed incentive systems to encourage students to speak French.
- Grade 4 and 5 students prepared their speeches for Concours d'Art Oratoire.
- Teachers started working on developing a French Immersion continuum of expectations based on the Manitoba curriculum. This work will continue into next year.
- Three bilingual concerts were presented to all the students in the school.

Due to the suspension of classes, TERM 3 information was not available, nor did we repeat the teacher survey in May to compare with October results.

Safe Schools -

By June 2020, 100% of the universal student population will meet safety guidelines and common expectations for behavior.

By June 2020, 80% of the targeted and intensive student populations will meet safety guidelines and common expectations for behavior.

Successes:

- The Positive Behaviour Intervention Support (PBIS) committee met monthly to discuss data and plan proactive and reactive strategies
- The school held one whole-school blitz's and 2 assemblies to teach and reinforce behaviour expectations
- PD was provided for the lunch supervisors on positive strategies to use with students in their care
- Desk pedal bikes were purchased to be used in most classrooms as a behaviour regulation strategy for students needing movement.
- 89% of students in the school received 0-1 Office managed referrals
- Targeted interventions were put in place including friendship club, active start and soft landing for students needing more targeted interventions.

Numeracy

By June 2020, students will confidently, accurately, and efficiently use mental math strategies to solve a variety of mental math problems.

Successes:

- All staff were encouraged to engage in number talks with their students
- All staff received ongoing professional development focusing on current mental math instruction.
- Numeracy committee was working on getting all staff to compile mental math strategies from each
 classroom and these were to be displayed in the school to create a mental math strategy gallery walk.
 Strategies were to be compiled to create a continuum. (This was not completed due to the suspension of
 classes.
- Students showed an increased use of a variety of mental math strategies due to the ongoing use of the number talk teaching strategy.

Literacy

ELA - By June 2021, 80% of Ecole Neil Campbell students will demonstrate at least one-year growth in their reading and writing including students with identified cognitive disabilities, EAL students, students in care, and self-identified indigenous populations.

FLA – By June 2021, 70% of French Immersion students will frequently engage in speaking French in the classroom and during French extra-curricular activities. Students will be expected to speak French 80% of the time in the classroom.

Numeracy

By June 2021, 80% of students will become mathematically literate citizens who use mathematics confidently, accurately and efficiently.

By June 2021, 90% of the student population will meet safety guidelines and common expectations for behavior.
