




In Math, students will finish their school supplies project where they get to think about where the school could dispense extra funds.

It is also essential that they know the list of personal pronouns. You know the famous "Je, tu, il, elle, on, nous, vous, ils, elles".




PBL projects/Steam activities!

Learning about statistics/ percent's with Smarties

















Our Grade 8 students have been doing a novel study on the beloved classic, "The Outsiders" by S.E. Hinton. I am certain that many of our ERP parents are familiar with the tale of Ponyboy, the greasers, and their rivalry with the infamous socs. Students just finished the book, and to no one's surprise, they ate up every last page of it! We are currently wrapping up our novel study by working on the final assignment. Students have a few options to choose from to demonstrate their comprehension of the story. One option is to create a one-page representation of the novel that includes significant scenes, quotes, symbols, vocabulary, and imagery from the story. They also have the option of creating either an Instagram profile page or designing a tattoo sleeve for a character of their choice. To cap everything off, we will be watching the 1983 film starring a young Rob Lowe, Matt Dillon, Tom Cruise, Patrick Swayze, and Emilio Estevez. Looking for something to chat about at the dinner table tonight? Ask your students about "The Outsiders" and some of the themes highlighted throughout the novel!











This year in the Mac Lab and Industrial Arts program, our students have begun utilizing design software to construct a multitude of different arrangements of products.

Our Grade 6 students have begun 3D modeling and using the 3D printer to print their designs into reality (pictured on the right).

We have recently purchased a Cricut Maker 3 for our Mac Lab, which allows our students another avenue to craft and create tangible, real life products while designing everything on the computer themselves.

Our Grade 7 students have just begun their time in the Mac Lab, with the commencement of term two. They will be working on Graphic Arts, utilizing industry-standard software such as Adobe Photoshop and Adobe Illustrator. While we have just begun to scratch the surface of the possibilities of graphics arts, there are already some wonderful pieces being constructed by students. The examples on the bottom of the page is our first assignment "digital colouring". With a little bit of hard work and practice, students will soon be designing and colouring their own images and graphics from scratch.



A huge shout out to our ERP family for their acts of generosity this month! We have made the holiday season a bit brighter for 5 families in our local community! Milles Merci!










Outdoor Education









Staff News


We look forward to continuing with all the exciting learning, reading and activities in the New Year.

together a new way to help reduce anxiety.

Friendship Room- Recess opportunity for students to help build new friendships in a supportive environment. Mme. Ambrose and I have seen so many new friendships develop in the last 2 months.

Small counselling groups for strategies to support 1) Anxiety, 2)

Problem-solving and 3) Mindfulness. These weekly groups will continue until January 20, 2022.

Thrival Kits- all Gr 5 students have been working on creating their own kit to help them with tools for selfregulation.

Here are just a few coping strategies over the holidays:

- 1. Do (only) your best- don't aim for perfection: aim for what you can manage
- 2. Take deep breaths- breathe slowly so your tummy goes up and down
- 3. Simplify- focus only on what needs to be done today.
- 4. Exercise- go for a short walk outside
- 5. Express gratitude- thinking and sharing with another person why you are grateful for them can help a person (and yourself) feel more joy...even when times are challenging.








Winter Break Activity Challenge

A Message from Curtis Basso, Director of Transportation



Winter driving conditions are here, and roads are not always clear!
The snow looks like it's here to stay. Remember roads may be slippery with ice hidden under the new snow. These conditions can make stopping or turning difficult at stops, intersections, and corners, so please be cautious when you see our school buses.

We may be stopping at any moment for children!
Remember—we are carrying precious cargo.

So, please adjust your driving to suit the conditions, especially when you see one of our many buses on your commute—keep your eyes peeled for their stop signs and our students. The piles of snow that line streets can make for tempting hills to climb, so parents, please talk to your children about the danger of slipping into traffic and advise them to stay on the sidewalk.

And drivers, be especially alert when driving near schools. Student safety is all our responsibility. Take it slow, and we will all get to where we need to be, safely.

School Closures

Schools very rarely close due to winter weather.

Winter Clothing

Please ensure that your child comes dressed appropriately for the weather each day. When the temperature or wind chill is between -27°C and -34°C, warm winter clothing is essential, and facial protection is recommended. When it is below -34°C, facial protection is essential, and it's recommended that children avoid going outdoors unaccompanied—skin will freeze in less than 10 minutes.

Busing

When the temperature is -35°C and/or wind chill is -45°C or colder at The Forks, metro Winnipeg school divisions (RETSD included) cancel buses for the entire day—but schools usually remain open.

We will post a cancellation alert on the RETSD website home page if buses are cancelled, and alert the media. If we have not posted a cancellation alert by 6:45 a.m., buses are running.

School Patrols

When the temperature or wind chill is between -27°C and -34°C, patrols will remain on post for 10 minutes. When it is -35°C to -39°C, patrols will remain on post for five minutes. When it is -40°C and below, no patrols will be on duty.

Recess

When the temperature or wind chill is between -25°C and -27°C, a shortened recess period may be warranted. When it is below -27°C, recess is usually moved indoors. This is at the discretion of the principal. *with the exception of Polar Bear Club students

Polar Bear Club Recess


For schools participating in Polar Bear Club Recess:

- Participation is voluntary.
- Parental consent is required.
- Students who have consent can participate in all or none of the recess breaks.
- Students must be dressed appropriately, including a warm toque/hat; snow pants; face covering; warm, insulated jacket; mittens; and snow boots.
- Students can go back inside at any time.
- Staff supervision will be provided.

All students will remain inside when the temperature/windchill is -40°C or below. If you have any questions not addressed by these guidelines, please contact your child's school.
