## **School Plan Priorities**

The priorities chosen for École Springfield Heights School align closely with the provincial and divisional priorities.

## Looking back at the 2024-2025 School Year

♦ Students will become literate citizens who use language to communicate, comprehend and think critically.

Successes: Teachers participated in professional development focused on reading instruction and assessment. Teachers then made adjustments in their practices which included reformatting reading conferences. This has resulted in deeper critical thinking by students and increased depth in sharing their understanding

♦ Students will be empowered to promote their own holistic wellbeing by identifying its components and putting those in action.

Successes: Students have been successful identifying strengths and tools to use to promote their wellbeing. Through assemblies, daily Mindful Start activities and classroom teaching, students have explored the Medicine Wheel, Zones of Regulation, Chill Zones, and Sources of Strength. Each one of these supports students to independently identify how to promote their own wellbeing.

♦ Students will feel a sense of belonging in our school community and be empowered to contribute to the community.

Successes: Through an exploration of cultural celebrations throughout the year, students have become more aware of a variety of celebrations that are important to the families in our community. Students demonstrate pride as they share their connections to the cultural celebrations presented. Some students have taken the initiative to create and share presentations online for the whole school about their own cultural celebrations . There is a growing awareness that everyone is important and belongs in our community.

## Looking ahead to the 2024-2025 School Year

Initiatives that we will focus on for next year are:

- Wellbeing— After piloting and exploring the Sources of Strength curriculum this year, all classes across the school will be implementing the program to support students to grow in their understanding of their sources of resiliency.
- ♦ Literacy- Students will be engaged in opportunities to explore literacy across all subjects with an emphasis on inquiry-based learning. The competencies of communication, collaboration, creativity, citizenship, connection to self and critical thinking will be prioritized during these explorations.
- Numeracy—Students will be engaged in math discussions and explorations with a focus on problem solving, critical thinking and growth mindset. Students will work on increasing their ability to explain their strategies and thinking.
- Building Community—We will work to strengthen the students' sense of belonging in our community by celebrating individual students through recognition in assemblies and by displaying pictures of school events on the monitor in the front lobby. We will continue to strengthen community connections between students across language programs through Dolphin Pod activities.
