News from the Guidance Department

Kindness Club

Before the holidays, some of our Grade 4 and 5 students formed Kindness Club and came up with some practical ways to be kind to others. One of their projects was selling candy canes to fellow students and donating the proceeds to a good cause. Kindness Club was able to raise almost \$200 which they chose to donate to World Vision for mosquito nets and medicine.

Conflict Mediation

In December, Mr. Chartier, Mrs. Unrau and Mrs. Pretula visited classrooms to teach students how to solve a problem. The lessons focused on staying calm and identifying the size of the problem. Students brainstormed various problems and then grouped them as small, medium or big. Students learned about reflective listening and had the opportunity to practice with a partner. A conflict mediation procedure was taught to all the classes with a simplified version used with the Kindergarten to Grade 2 students. The procedure that was taught to students is shown below. We ask that you model the use of this conflict mediation procedure at home with your child to help them learn how to identify the size of a problem, use various problem-solving strategies and practice reflective listening.

Grade 5 Peacekeepers are being trained this month to use the problem-solving wheel along with the mediation strategies to help younger students solve conflicts at recess.

The Zones of Regulation

Zones of Regulation is an evidence-based curriculum designed to help students gain emotional awareness, regulation skills, and improve their problem-solving abilities which we use here at Westview. It is not a numerical rating system, a way to label "good" and "bad" emotions and behavior, or a classroom behavioral chart. We do not praise kids for being in the green zone, but praise them for identifying an accurate zone and choosing helpful regulation strategies.

The Four Zones:



Blue Zone	Low alertness or energy level. Body might move slowly. Might feel: sad, tired, sick or bored.
Green Zone	Regulated, alertness, in control, ready to learn, just right energy. This is the Zone students generally need to be in for school work. Might feel: calm, happy, focused, or content.
Yellow Zone	Heightened state of alertness, more energy, still have some control. May feel: stressed, frustrated, excited, silly, nervous, confused. Might look like wiggly.
Red Zone	Extreme state of alertness, LOTS of energy, not in control, or very intense feelings. May feel: angry, rage, explosive behaviour, panic, terror or elation. When someone is in the red zone they aren't in control anymore.

How to Help Students Using the Zones

- 1. Help students gain awareness of the zones by making observations about your own behavior. What zone are you in, how can you tell, and what strategies do you use?
- 2. Talk about what zone is expected in that situation and how you will get there.
- Talk about how people's actions affect the zone that you are in and how you feel.
- 4. Help students label their zones and choose strategies.
- 5. Reinforce the identification of the zone, the zone to move to, and trialing a strategy.

Zones Strategy Categories:

- Calming
- Thinking
- Sensory

It's chilly outside, so please remember to send your child with mitts, hats, scarves, ski pants and a warm coat. Please also label your child's clothing items as our Lost & Found fills up quickly!



Cold Weather Guidelines

Periodically, guidelines are requested by schools regarding when students should remain indoors during extremely cold weather. The following guidelines have been developed to assist schools in making these decisions.

-17°C to -25°C: Normal winter clothing generally adequate. Pleasant conditions for most outdoor activities cease.


-25°C to –27°C: Warm winter clothing recommended. Most outdoor activities unpleasant without facial protection. Exposed flesh will freeze with prolonged exposure. Shortened recess period may be warranted.

NOTE: FOR WINDCHILLS LISTED BELOW, THE DECISION TO KEEP STUDENTS INDOORS IS AT THE DISCRETION OF THE PRINCIPAL.

-27°C to -34°C: Warm clothing is essential. Facial protection is recommended. Outdoor activities are not recommended. Exposed skin will freeze in 10-15 minutes. Indoor recess advised. Patrols' duty reduced to 10 minutes.

Below -34°C: Facial protection essential. Extremely dangerous for outdoor activities or travel. Avoid going outdoors unaccompanied. Skin will freeze in less than 10 minutes. Patrols' duty reduced to 5 minutes.

Below –40°C: Conditions for outdoor travel such as walking becomes dangerous. Exposed skin areas will freeze in minutes. No patrols on duty.



HOME-work

If your family is like ours, when the kids get home we ask "How was your day?" or "What did you do today?" and we get a wide range of answers. Sometimes the kids surprise us and actually tell us some of the many great things we know that happened during the day, while other days we get the answer of "nothing." Recently I came across this article titled 'Fifteen Questions to Replace "How Was School Today"; I highly encourage you to give it a read. The article is very brief and provides parents with some helpful tips on how to communicate with your kids. We have now begun to do this in our home and found it to be very useful in opening up more conversation with our family.



#YellowIsForHello

RETSD Talks Mental Health

Please join us for a free evening focusing on building student resiliency and positive mental health.

Our guest presenter is Sam Fiorella, co-founder of The Friendship Bench, the not-for-profit organization behind the #YellowIsForHello hashtag. The bright yellow benches link students to mental health resources and have been appearing in high schools and universities nationwide.

In October 2014, Sam's son Lucas took his own life after suffering from depression in silence. After his death, Sam and other family members discovered Lucas was a great support to friends and classmates who suffered from anxiety and depression, reaching out to them when he sensed they needed help. Each conversation started with a "hello" and in each case, Lucas gave them the courage they needed to speak with family or get help from professionals. Sam is continuing Lucas's legacy and helping to spread awareness and education about youth mental health.

Sam will be helping us launch the #YellowIsForHello campaign in some of our RETSD schools. This initiative is to help reduce stigma, encourage peer-to-peer conversations about mental health, and link our students to local mental health resources.
