## Jordan's Principle



During the month of May, we have been learning about Jordan's Principle and Bear Witness Day. Jordan was a First Nations child from Norway House Cree Nation in Manitoba who died in 2005 at the age of five due to delays in accessing services. His case brought attention to the need for Jordan's Principle. Jordan's Principle is a step towards reconciliation and equity, highlighting the importance of defending the rights of Indigenous children. Bear Witness Day on May 10<sup>th</sup> is a day that invites people to "Bear Witness" and advocate for the full implementation of Jordan's Principle.

As part of our learning, Kindergarten students made plasticine bears with a medicine wheel. These represent the teddy bear Jordan had with him in the hospital.



Grade 5 students created a Witness Blanket to share their learning and experiences. Students chose to celebrate the culture and knowledge from Indigenous People, to highlight the crimes committed from the residential school system and to bear witness and push for a better future through truth and reconciliation.



# **Fire Safety**



During the month of February, Public Education Officers from the Winnipeg Fire Department came to Springfield Heights. Students were engaged as the fire fighters shared important safety information during the presentations. In June, the Public Education Officers returned and brought the Fire Safety house which allows students to learn about fire situations in homes such as kitchens and fireplaces and participate in a simulation of evacuating a fire.







## Little Green Sprouts in Room 9!



In Room 9 we are participating in a program called Little Green Sprouts. Little Green Sprouts is a planting program that teaches us how to plant seeds and grow food. Since January we have planted five different seeds. We have planted fava beans, popcorn seeds, speckled peas, red radishes, and black-eyed beans! We learned a seed needs LAWNS (light, air, water, nutrients, and space) to grow healthy. After the sprouts were 6-9 inches tall, we harvested them and had a salad party! For our salad party, we cut other vegetables including carrots, bell peppers, and cucumbers. We then had a salad buffet with lettuce, croutons, the vegetables, ranch dressing, and of course our sprouts!

For our latest project with Little Green Sprouts, we created terrariums! The terrarium is pretty cool because it takes care of itself by using the water cycle to water the plant. We used jars, rocks, soil, charcoal, decorations, and black-eyed beans to create our terrariums. Next, we are going to plant sunflower seeds! We are excited to continue our learning using the Little Green Sprouts program!

#### Did You Know?

- -Did you know big seeds can be soaked in water to speed up germination? Little seeds do not need to be soaked.
- -Did you know some seeds need to have a "black out phase"? The black out phase is when seeds need to be in complete darkness to begin growing.
- -Did you know there is a terrarium that has not been watered in 40 years?



## **Global School Play Day**

Global School Play Day began in 2015 to promote opportunities for students to participate in free play. Free play is essential for children's healthy social and emotional development. In his <u>TEDx lecture</u>, Peter Gray clearly argues the case that today's kids do not grow up playing and this has negatively impacted them in many ways. Over the years, opportunities for play have decreased and at the same time, anxiety, depression, feelings of helplessness, suicide, and narcissism in children and adolescents have increased. ## We Recycle

We collect the following items throughout the year to help our community and the environment. Students and families can bring items to school and deposit them in the recycling center. As the buckets fill up, students will be involved in organizing items for distribution to organizations.

#### **Eyeglasses**

Don't throw away someone's chance for a clearer tomorrow! Donate your eyeglasses today! We will be collecting used eyeglasses which will be distributed to children and adults in developing countries. By 2017, this national organization had distributed 4,750,000 pairs of eyeglasses worldwide.



#### **Hygiene Products**

Individual packaged hygiene products will be distributed to local shelters or used in hampers.









#### **Batteries**

With the support of the Call 2 Recycle program, we are able to collect consumer dry cell batteries weighing 5 kg or less for recycling, this includes:



Alkaline (AA, AAA, etc.)	Lithium ion (Li-ion)	Lithium primary
Nickel cadmium (Ni-Cd)	Nickel metal hydride (Ni-MH)	Nickel zinc batteries (Ni-Zn)
Small Sealed Lead Acid (SLA)	Lithium ion (Li-ion) for electric bikes, scooters and skateboards	

#### **Writing Instruments and Ink Cartridges**

With the support of Staples, we will collect used ink cartridges and writing utensils including, pens, sharpies, highlighters, markers etc. These items will be dropped off at Staples to be recycled.











#### **Metal Tabs**

Tabs from beverage containers such as pop cans, juice cans or other items such as fruit cans, pet food cans, etc. will be donated to the Tabs for Wheelchairs program. You can also take tabs, cans or metal of any kind and size (appliances etc.) to **Western Scrap Metals Inc.** at 18 Sutherland Ave. Inform them that the value of what you bring is to go to Tabs for Wheelchairs to credit their account.



#### **TAB Math**

There are approximately 1500 tabs in a pound. 14 million tabs will purchase a \$6000.00 wheelchair. 24 million tabs will purchase a \$10 000.00 wheelchair.
