





SIDEWALKS NEAR SCHOOL TOO DANGEROUS TO USE!

January and February roared in like Lions and brought with it, massive snow falls and strong wind chills. The sidewalks along Prince Rupert were so full, that they were unwalkable. The 4 corners of Besant & Prince Rupert were too difficult to try to go through. Students use these areas all day long, going to and from school. As well, the school patrols were cancelled due to the dangerous conditions!



On February 7, 2019, we found that the City had left a very large snow hill in the middle of the sidewalk, right up against the school fence! The snow on the sidewalk was so deep it was past the kid's knees. Salisbury Morse Place (795 Prince Rupert Ave.) is zoned as a: **P3S - Residential Street treated as a P2 (Collector/Bus Route)**. According to the 311 websites, this means: "PRIORITY II streets shall normally be plowed to **bare pavement** over the full pavement width".



The students and patrols had to trudge through the snow, climb up and over the hill many times throughout the day and some students had to walk directly on the road! This was a very dangerous situation with slippery roads and not as much space on the roads due to snow build up. I personally called 311 and submitted a formal complaint and I also sent an email to Councillor Jason Schreyer (EK/Elmwood), bringing this urgent and very dangerous situation to his attention. After several complaints to the city and to Mr. Schreyer's office, the sidewalks were cleared, the corner of Prince Rupert & Besant cleaned up and salt was also spread on the corners to reduce the slippery conditions for drivers.

Unfortunately, this is an ongoing issue that the school has been fighting for years. I urge all parents to call 311 or send an email complaint to: <u>311@winnipeg.ca</u>. We need to send a very clear message to the City of Winnipeg and to our local councilor, that our Children's safety is out number #1 priority. Allergies


There are several students with life threatening allergies in our school. We work very hard to provide a safe environment for all students. We ask that all families consider the following in the interest of safety:

Kindergarten registration is open for all children born in 2014. This means that your child must have had their 5th birthday on or before December 31st, 2019.

In order to register your child, you must bring: 2 pieces of identification regarding proof of address as well as 1 piece of identification regarding child's proof of age

Registration Required Documentation:

Proof of Address: (2 items are required) *Driver's license *Manitoba Health Card *Tenancy Agreement *Offer to purchase documents (completed – signature) *Utility bill (current)

Proof of age: (1 item is required) *Birth Certificate *Baptismal Certificate *Passport *Certificate of Live Birth Registration (long pink form filled out in the hospital at time of child's birth), signed by Director of Vital Statistics *Valid Treaty Card

This information is very important and must be presented at the time of registration. Please pass this information to any neighbours or friends who have children ready for Kindergarten, but do not receive this newsletter. Thank you for your help.

School of Choice - Parents/Guardians do have the ability to make a request that their child attend a different school from the one designated by their home address by the school division. School of Choice requests for students living within the River East Transcona School Division will be received along with the registration forms, but notification of acceptance will not be available until the end of June 2019.

Out of Division Schools of Choice applications will be received starting May 1st, 2019



Did you know that being a Block Parent® in your area can also help to reduce crime? All just by hanging a sign in your window! In areas where the Block Parent® signs are displayed criminal activity can be deterred by letting everyone know that particular community has an organized program that works in close partnership with the Winnipeg Police Service and is always keeping a watchful eye in the community. We've all seen the posts on the community web pages that are talking about property or auto vandalism occurrences, becoming a Block Parent® is one active way to help to reduce these crimes.

What does a Block Parent® do?

- · Offer help from dangerous or frightening situations (caught in severe weather, strangers)
- Offer assistance to persons in distress (ill, bullied, injured) by telephoning the police or home of the child or citizen in need.
- Assist the police by reporting suspicious or criminal activity in the neighbourhood.
- Remove their BLOCK PARENT® sign when not available. (The sign is an indication to children and adults that someone is <u>available</u> and they will receive immediate help in the event of an emergency.)

What do Block Parents NOT do?

- Provide food or beverage
- Provide toilet facilities
- Provide transportation
- Administer first aid
- Leave their home to break up fights
- Actively engage with any dangerous person or situation

It's SO easy to become a Block Parent® you must be a responsible citizen, aged 18 years and over who:

- Cares about the well being of everyone, especially children and seniors
- Is screened by the Winnipeg Police Service (Forms included in the BP application, no charge)
- Is willing to provide help when available
- Does not HAVE to be a parent

It's free of charge to join, there are no meetings to attend and if you are only available a couple hours a day that is great! <u>PLEASE consider joining to help make YOUR AREA a safer community by contacting;</u>

The River East Transcona School Division has established this policy to ensure effective steps in communication of concerns and/or questions between parents/guardians, adult students, members of the community and divisional staff and between staff members. Each member of the division's staff and the board of trustees should follow these steps.

If a parent/guardian, adult student, a member of the community or a staff member has a concern or question they should follow this sequence:

- (1) Contact the employee's work place and request to speak to the person. The employee may be unavailable, so leave a message with telephone numbers where you can be reached during the day as well as the evening.
- (2) If you are not satisfied with the employee's response to your concern, contact their supervisor. If you contact the supervisor first, s/he will refer you to step one.
- (3) If your concern is not resolved to your satisfaction, contact the superintendent. If you contact the superintendent first, s/he will refer you to step one or two.
- (4) In the event that you believe that your concern has not been addressed, you may write a letter to the chair of the board of trustees. If you contact the chair or any trustee without going through steps one to three, they will refer you back to step one. A trustee may assist you in making the appropriate contacts in steps one through three.
 - When a written concern about a staff member is received, the individual named will be notified and provided with a copy of the written concern and given an opportunity for explanation and written response.
 - At any point in the complaint process, the individual named has the right to have an advocate present.
- (5) All correspondence to the chair of the board of trustees is reviewed at a board meeting. However, all personnel matters must be dealt with in-camera.
- (6) At all steps in the process, you are requested to tell each level that you are not satisfied and are going up to the next level.

Policy KE - Concern Protocol



CONCERNS AND COMPLAINTS PROCEDURES

The formal procedures for managing a concern or complaint are as follows:

- (1) Contact the person who is most directly involved and ask to speak to the person. If the individual is not available, leave a message including daytime and evening telephone numbers.
- (2) If the concern has not been resolved, contact the individual's supervisor. Complaints that are brought directly to the supervisor will be redirected to step one.
- (3) If the concern still has not been resolved, contact the superintendent or designate. If contact begins at the superintendent's department, it will be referred to step one.
- (4) In the event that the concern has not been addressed, an appeal of the superintendent's decision shall be handled by the board of trustees through written correspondence to the chair. Neither the board, a committee of the board, nor a trustee shall consider or act on a complaint that has not been explored at the appropriate administrative level, nor shall they contact staff directly in a personal attempt to resolve the problem. A member of the board of trustees may assist the complainant in making the appropriate contacts required to complete steps one to three.
 - (a) When a written concern is received that names a staff member, the individual named will be notified and provided with a copy of the written concern and given an opportunity for explanation and written response.
 - (b) At any point in the complaint process, the individual named has the right to have an advocate present.
- (5) All correspondence to the chair of the board of trustees is reviewed at a board meeting. All personnel matters shall be dealt with in camera.
- (6) Written response of the board of trustees' decision will be provided to the parties involved in the complaint.
