### Making Space for Makerspace!

This month, students have had a chance to come down to the learning commons with their class to learn about Makerspace! A Makerspace is a collaborative workspace inside a school or library for making, learning, exploring, and sharing that uses high tech to no tech tools. This may range from building and designing a locker organizer with popsicle sticks and cardboard to building and designing elaborate code to direct robots through mazes. Makerspace is a place for kids to trying something new, learn problem solving skills, make mistakes and challenge themselves to find solutions. Building makes ideas hands on and come to life! When students design and build something. they learn to work through challenges, be a problem solver and get creative to make something work! Building with LEGO and other materials promotes fine motor skills, improves creativity, develops problem solving, mathematical thinking and planning skills. Coding robots and Micro-bits promotes problem solving skills, systematic thinking, and logical reasoning. Coding allows students to bring ideas to life while learning to analyze potential problems and trouble shoot. Along with many other activities makerspace offers, coding promotes creativity and opens doors to students finding a new interest or passion. Once every class has had a chance to come to the learning commons to try it out, makerspace will become a lunch club that students can drop in and explore their creativity!

#### NOTICE TO GRADE 6 STUDENTS RE BUSING



Grade 6 students currently being transported by a RETSD school bus will not be eligible for free busing in Grade 7. According to the Manitoba Education Public Schools Act Regulation (M.R. 259/2006) Grade 7 to Grade 12 students living within the city limits are not eligible for school bus transportation. Fee-for-Service may be available. If you are considering this option, please submit a

Transportation Application – Fee-For-Service 2024-25 form. Forms are available from the school office or on the Transportation icon located on divisional home page at www.retsd.mb.ca.

Fee-For-Service applications must be submitted to the Transportation Department by June 30<sup>th</sup> of each school year. Applications received after June 30<sup>th</sup> will be reviewed on an individual basis.

### \*NOTICE - FEE-FOR-SERVICE BUSING



If Fee-For-Service transportation is required again for your student(s) for the upcoming school year, a 2024-25 application form must be submitted to the Transportation Department. Transportation Application – Fee-For-Service 2024-2025 forms are available from the school office or on the Transportation icon located on the divisional home page at www.retsd.mb.ca.

Fee-For-Service applications must be submitted to the Transportation Department by <u>June 30<sup>th</sup></u> of each school year. Applications received after June 30<sup>th</sup> will be reviewed on an individual basis.





#### 7C and 7D Shelter Project

Two grade 7 classes embark on a new challenge, wondering how they can have a positive impact on the unhoused citizens of Winnipeg. This 6 week long project began with a presentation from Siloam Mission and Main Street Project. Students learned what the needs of this community are and what is already been done to help meet some of these needs. Students investigated how other cities are providing temporary shelter in the winter or building tiny home communities. They were tasked with designing a pop-up shelter that would help support the unhoused community during the harsh Winnipeg Winters. In small groups, students created blueprints, planned, and designed with the needs of the community in mind and began building prototypes for their shelters. They had a special guest, a structural engineer, meet with their group to provide feedback on their design and ask questions that lead them to making adjustments and improvements to their design. Finally, students had the opportunity to go to Siloam Mission to learn more and volunteer in the clothing donation process. After having participated in these many experiences throughout the project, students put together a final presentation where they proposed their shelter solutions to a panel. The shared what was challenging for them, what they had found success in and proudly explained the choices they made on their design and build of their pop-up shelter. This was a great celebration of learning. Students and teachers felt equally proud of the major accomplishments, insights and learning that had been shared. Through this 6 week long project, students learned about homelessness, advocacy, identity and the value in empathy and understanding.




