ADMINISTRATORS' MESSAGE

We hope you all benefitted from the March spring break respite whether you traveled or stayed home. Warmer weather is thawing Old Man Winter's icy grip and the return to Daylight Savings Time delivered an increase in our daily dose of natural Vitamin D - if even only psychologically.

We co-hosted the Tri-School Career Fair held April 4 here at CPET that was very well attended by the community and our students. We thank our Student Services team (Mme Klausen, Mme Parent, Mme Goulet), the CPET staff, and the teams from Murdoch MacKay and Transcona Collegiate, and our community partners for their collaboration.

We have reason to celebrate athletics and student achievement this season. In sports, our teams were able to claim 3 finalists banners in one week. In academics, 48 % of our students earned Semester 1 honour roll status! *Félicitations les élèves!*

As part of our Safe Schools mandate, our Positive School-Wide behaviour team once again targeted increased attendance and launched a second Perfect Attendance campaign throughout the month of March. During our first campaign in November, 76 students attended all their courses contributing to an overall attendance rate of 93.4 % at the end of the first semester.

During this second blitz, 36 students had perfect attendance and the overall school attendance rate dipped to 90.07 %. The attendance rate might seem impressive at first glance but consider that a 90% attendance rate is often considered by some organizations to be the benchmark of...wait for it... chronic absenteeism! (CBC link [School absenteeism can set off troubling chain of events](#)) Ouch! Granted, weather-related conditions played a little havoc with March attendance rates, but we need to understand that there is room to improve.

Debating the reasons behind the absences – illness, appointments, anxiety and avoidance, family vacations, sleeping in – exceeds the scope of this forum but the message is simple: a definitive and proven correlation exists between attendance and academic success; a drop in one area mirrors a decrease in the other. Concerned or curious about your child's attendance? The parent portal provides live information about your son or daughter's attendance. Any concerns can be followed up with his or her teacher or administration. Likewise, teachers and administration endeavour to bring concerns forward also.

While this edition of the Mot juste allows us to glance back on past events, your administrators' eyes are firmly set on Term 4 and on planning for the upcoming 2019-20 academic year. BEATING STRESS

Stress is a physical, mental, or emotional response to external events that causes physical or mental tension. For many, stress is part of everyday life. Driving, waiting in line, homework and demands from school, friends and work can leave students feeling stressed. If not kept in check, stress can become overwhelming. Students who suffer from chronic stress may require a more intensive coping program, but for everyday stress, try one or more of the following breathing exercises:

Deep breathing. Take a deep breath into your belly, inflating it like a balloon. Hold for a few seconds then exhale, pushing the air out completely by deflating your stomach.

Wave breathing. Fill your stomach with air, then fill your lungs with air. Hold for a few seconds. Exhale the air in your lungs, followed by the air in your stomach. Start this breathing exercise off

slowly to avoid becoming dizzy.

Rhythmic breathing. Breathe in normally for a count of 2. Hold for a count of 2. Exhale for a count of 4 (work up to a count of 3-3-6, then 4-4-8, etc.).

Other strategies include: Drinking lots of water (rehydrate), decluttering your room/locker/car, exercising, keeping a journal, getting a massage and laughing. Laughter reduces pain by releasing endorphins that are more potent than equivalent amounts of morphine. So, take a deep breath, drink some water, go for a walk and enjoy a good comedy...your body and mind will thank you for it.

Stress is not what happens to us. It's our response to what happens and response is something we can choose.

At this event the students had the chance to experience hands on field work with scientists from many different fields of research from the University of Manitoba and the Department of Fisheries and Oceans. The major concept of this event was to come together with over 200 students from different areas of Manitoba and to have a better understanding of climate change in the arctic.

Arctic science day is an all day outdoors event and luckily for this years group of students the weather was sunny and bright. Throughout the day, students were challenged to perform hands-on experiments such as putting a light probe under the ice, taking an ice core, and taking water samples, while shifting stations every hour. Each station brought new concepts into view and mainly focused on Biology and Light, Marine Mammals, Arctic Archaeology, Oceanography, Contaminants and Sea Ice. This day is truly special because it inspires and educates the youth about career opportunities that may interest them within their

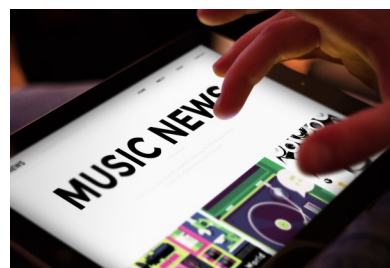
future. Furthermore this day provides knowledge of the position one plays in today's society and community, on having the capability to diminish human impact on the environment.

VOYAGE EN FRANCE

Bonjour! We had an incredible time in Paris and the French Riviera. 41 students and 6 chaperones had the chance to celebrate local culture, gain global perspective, and explore some of the world's most fascinating sites.

We departed on Thursday March 21st and began our visit to Paris the next morning. Tired but happy, students were able to spend time in the Quartier Latin and the famous Notre-Dame de Paris. The cathedral is one of the finest examples of French Gothic architecture.

France is a beautiful country, but we love Canada so much that we decided to spend some time on Canada's territory in Vimy on Saturday. Vimy is situated in the Pas-de-Calais in northern France. We visited the Canadian National Vimy Memorial dedicated to the Battle of Vimy Ridge and the Canadian soldiers who were killed during the war. After our visit to Vimy, we stopped in the lovely city of Arras for lunch. Being significantly influenced by near-by Belgium, the birthplace of French fries, Arras is known for serving delicious fries and the students and chaperones consumed copious amounts!

Sunday was quite a touristy day as we visited all the Paris icons you can imagine. We embarked on a guided tour of Paris, seeing, for those who were not asleep on the bus, the Arc de Triomphe, la Tour Eiffel, le Panthéon, les Champs Élysées, l'Opéra, la place de la Concorde, etc. In the afternoon, we visited the beautiful Palais de Versailles with hundreds if not thousands of other tourists. The walking tour inside le Palais was not as peaceful as the walk in the beautiful gardens, but it was very interesting to see how royals lived back in the day. We ended the day by going up the Eiffel Tower. Looking over the city was an incredible experience!

Monday was as busy as Sunday. We started our day with a visit to le Musée du Louvre, the world's largest art museum and a historic monument in Paris. The museum is a central landmark of the city where we spent nearly three hours. We then took another guided tour of Paris but this time on a river boat which gave us a new view of the city. We took a little bit of time to shop after our tour on the Seine river and headed to Montmartre where we climbed up the stairs to visit la Basilique Sacré-Coeur. The Basilica of the Sacred Heart of Paris is a Roman Catholic church, a popular landmark and the second most visited monument in Paris, the basilica stands at the summit of the butte Montmartre, the highest point in the city. Being a very touristy area, students were able to find many souvenirs for themselves, friends and family.

Those first few days, every minute was filled visiting iconic Paris landmarks. We left the stress of Paris to head south, home of sunny weather, magnificent architecture and lots of markets. After a nap, cards games and movie watching, we arrived in Avignon by TGV (high speed train). We visited le Pont du Garde, le Palais des Papes and sang “Sur le pont d’Avignon” while posing for a group picture in front of the infamous bridge. The next day, we visited Les Baux de Provence, St-Rémy and Arles. We learned a lot about history, culture and we witnessed the everyday life of the region by walking around in the markets and conversing with locals.



Our last few days were spent in the sun and on the beautiful beaches of the French Riviera like you see in the movies. Talking about movies, we stopped in Cannes, home of the International Film Festival. We also visited a parfumerie called Fragonard in Eze on our way to Nice and Monaco. We discovered a new culture in this region. Students were impressed by the life of the rich and famous; expensive cars, expensive yachts and expensive clothes but the beautiful Mediterranean and the warm sun was probably the most memorable.

We headed back home with our heads full of memories and our hearts filled with experiences.
