RETSD Cold Weather Policies and Patrols

School divisions in metro Winnipeg use the temperature at The Forks as the indicator of severe weather. The general rule is that if the wind chill is -45 C or colder at The Forks (as posted by Environment Canada at about 6:10 a.m.), all Winnipeg school divisions cancel buses for the whole day but schools usually remain open. If buses are cancelled, an alert will be posted on the RETSD division website home page and all major radio stations and local television stations will announce busing cancellations.

Cold weather also impacts school patrols. If the wind chill is between -27 C and -34 C, a patrol's time at their

post is not to exceed 10 minutes. If the wind chill is between -35 C and -40 C, patrols will only be at their posts for five minutes, and posts more than a five-minute walk from the school will not be patrolled. There will be no patrols on their posts when the wind chill is -40 C or colder.

The decision to keep students indoors at recess is at the discretion of the principal when the wind chill is -27 C or colder.

Patrol start times:

Patrols are asked to be at school for 8:40am. In the afternoon, students will be on duty from 3:25 to 3:40. As the weather gets colder, please ensure you wear scarves, hats, mitts, snow pants, boots, etc., and don't wear anything that will restrict vision. Warm clothes and facial protection are essential!

Hamper applications are now being accepted

Who can apply:

Anyone in need (Winnipeg/St. Norbert) may apply for a hamper. All hamper applications are taken by phone at Hamper Application Call <u>Centres</u>.

Hampers include: Canned and packaged food as well as a chicken or appropriate sized turkey based on the household size. Children 14 and under receive a gift.

Hamper pickup:

Starts Saturday December 8th 9AM at the Christmas Cheer Board warehouse.

Hamper deliveries:

Begins Saturday, December 8th - 9AM and hopefully are finished by December 21. As we rely on volunteer drivers, delivery date and time cannot be provided. Hamper delivery is attempted two times, on the second unsuccessful attempt an information sheet is left explaining you must come to the warehouse to pick up your hamper.

Our Hamper Application Call Centres are extremely busy; please have patience when calling, thanks.

Employment Income Assistance (EIA) applicants:

Please call **204-948-2022** to apply and have your EIA case number ready. EIA hamper application Cut-Off is Thursday Dec 21 at noon

Low income, pensioners, students, new Canadian applicants:

Please call **204-989-5683** to apply and have your Manitoba Health card information for all adults in the household.

It is important that you provide current & complete information for each adult and child in your household when applying for a hamper. Personal household contact information and income and expense information is required. All children 18 and under are recorded as well.

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Block Parents Are Needed in Winnipeg



The Block Parent Program[®] of Winnipeg is experiencing a shortage of volunteers in YOUR AREA and is asking for YOUR help.

The Block Parent[®] Program has evolved over the years and now not only focuses on the safety of the children in our community but also seniors and any other citizen that may be in distress. It is here for the safety of all citizens in our community, but it desperately needs your help.

Did you know that being a Block Parent[®] in your area can also help to reduce crime? All just by hanging a sign in your window! In areas where the Block Parent[®] signs are displayed criminal activity can be deterred by letting everyone know that particular community has an organized program that works in close partnership with the Winnipeg Police Service and is always keeping a watchful eye in the community. We've all seen the posts on the community web pages that are talking about property or auto vandalism occurrences, becoming a Block Parent[®] is one active way to help to reduce these crimes.

What does a Block Parent® do?

- · Offer help from dangerous or frightening situations (caught in severe weather, strangers)
- Offer assistance to persons in distress (ill, bullied, injured) by telephoning the police or home of the child or citizen in need.
- Assist the police by reporting suspicious or criminal activity in the neighbourhood.
- Remove their BLOCK PARENT[®] sign when not available. (The sign is an indication to children and adults that someone is <u>available</u> and they will receive immediate help in the event of an emergency.)

What do Block Parents NOT do?

- Provide food or beverage
- Provide toilet facilities
- Provide transportation
- Administer first aid
- Leave their home to break up fights
- Actively engage with any dangerous person or situation

It's SO easy to become a Block Parent[®] you must be a responsible citizen, aged 18 years and over who:

- Cares about the well being of everyone, especially children and seniors
- Is screened by the Winnipeg Police Service (Forms included in the BP application, no charge)
- Is willing to provide help when available
- Does not HAVE to be a parent

It's free of charge to join, there are no meetings to attend and if you are only available a couple hours a day that is great! <u>PLEASE consider joining to help make YOUR AREA a safer community by contacting;</u>
