#### **CONCERN PROTOCOL**

River East Transcona School Division recognizes that, on occasion, concerns may arise. Students or parents/guardians of students may raise their concerns or appeal decisions as follows:

- a. The decision of a Teacher is first to be discussed with the Teacher.
- b. If the parties are unable to come up with an agreeable solution, **the Teacher's decision** may be appealed to the Administrator.
- c. The decision of the Administrator may be appealed to the Superintendent.
- d. The decision of the Superintendent may be appealed to the Board of Trustees. A letter outlining the concerns should be sent to the Board of Trustees in care of the Board Chairperson.

#### THE ZONES OF REGULATION

At Westview School, many classrooms are learning about the Zones of Regulation. The Zones of Regulation (by Leah Kuypers) is a series of lessons designed to help students learn how to identify their feelings, emotions, states of alertness and moods. It also helps kids learn how to use tools such as sensory tools, calming strategies and thinking techniques to regulate and manage the Zone they are in.

Another important component of the Zones of Regulation is Social Thinking. By developing skills in reading facial expressions and body language, students learn about perspective-taking and discuss how our behaviours can impact how others think, feel and react.

It is important for students to understand that all zones are ok and that it is natural to experience all of the zones. Once we gain insight into what zone we are in, we can then choose a tool that will help us manage our zone based on the environment and people around us so that we can engage in expected behaviours.

#### **Descriptions of the Zones**

The **Red Zone** is used to describe extremely heightened states of alertness and intense emotions. A person may be elated or experiencing anger, rage, explosive behavior, devastation, or terror when in the Red Zone.

The Yellow Zone is also used to describe a heightened state of alertness and elevated emotions; however, one has some control when they are in the Yellow Zone. A person may be experiencing stress, frustration, anxiety, excitement, silliness, the wiggles, or nervousness when in the Yellow Zone.

The **Green Zone** is used to describe a calm state of alertness. A person may be described as happy, focused, content, or ready to learn when in the Green Zone. This is the zone where optimal learning occurs.

The **Blue Zone** is used to describe low states of alertness and down feelings, such as when one feels sad, tired, sick, or bored.

By talking with your child about his/her feelings, or *Zones*, he/she can better identify and understand emotions; you can then have discussions about what calming strategies or thinking techniques work best for your child when he/she is in the Red, Yellow or Blue Zone. By sharing with your child what strategies <u>you</u> use when you're feeling worried, angry or sad, you can then model and practice them together!



One of the tools we are using to help our students solve problems within the school is the Problem-Solving Wheel. The wheel is colour-coded to help students identify the size of the problem, the zone they may be in, and the strategy that would best suit the situation.

On our wheel, green represents small problems, yellow represents medium problems and red represents a big problem that requires the support of an adult. We are working hard within our classrooms to model the use of this tool and have a large-scale problem-solving wheel on display on the back of our building near the playground for the kids to use outside.



#### **NEWS FROM ROOM 11**


We are learning about Living Things.

#### **DISCOVERY TIME**

Ms. Crabb and Mrs. Gordillo's classes begin each day with Discovery Time. We started doing Discovery Time last year and we have found it made a considerable difference to our morning routine as well as to the overall connection the students have with one another. Discovery Time lasts approximately 15- 20 minutes and gives the students a chance to interact with one another, as well as giving teachers a chance to interact with the students and talk to them about their evening or how their day started.

This year we decided to incorporate provocations for the students with the multiple intelligences and curricular outcomes in mind. Activities include:

- fine motor activities (to get our hands ready to print)
- science activities (where students explore different nature-based items)
- literacy activities (where students explore letters and printing)
- math activities (where students explore patterns, sorting and addition)
- art activities.

Each student tries a new activity each morning, usually working in a small group of three or four. Here are some pictures from Ms. Crabb's class during Discovery Time this year:









# **Orange Shirt Day**

On Friday, September 29th it was 'Orange Shirt Day', a day of recognition of the Indigenous children who were placed in residential homes years ago. The history, understanding and appreciation of Indigenous People is something we continuously incorporate into our learning, and on September 29, we decided to show our support by dedicating the entire day by doing so.

Our day began by a visit from our principal, Mr. Chartier. He read to us and taught us about the origin of Orange Shirt Day. Phyllis Webstad was an Indigenous girl who's brand new orange shirt was taken from her on her first day of Residential school. As a class we discussed how we might feel if something of ours was taken away. Throughout the day, Ms. Buchanan read to us from the novel Fatty Legs, a true story about a girl who attended a Residential school. We sat outside on the rocks and participated in a sharing circle to talk about our thoughts and feelings in regards to the book. Later we watched a video on Inuit throat singing and drumming, and even attempted it ourselves! Our teacher taught us about Aboriginal dot painting and we got started on making our own creations in the liking of this style!

We've learned a lot about what happened in these schools and we are proud that we could take a stand, wear orange, embrace the Indigenous culture and show that we believe all children matter!

# **Emergency Procedures**

Your son/daughter's safety is very important to us and we have policies and procedures in place at both the Divisional and school levels to support their safety. Our school division has been working with the Winnipeg Police Service, as well as referencing materials from the RCMP and Manitoba Education and Advanced Learning, in order to review and strengthen the procedures we have in place to protect students and staff in the event of a safety threat at school. We would like to share details of these procedures with you.

Safety procedures fall into two categories: Hold and Secure, and Lockdown.

**Hold and Secure** will be activated if there is a *potential threat* <u>outside</u> the school. In these situations, the police typically contact the school and direct the school to go into Hold and Secure. When there is no longer a threat outside the school building, the police inform us that we can resume regular activities.

If our school is in Hold and Secure, the following procedures will apply:

- All exterior doors will be locked.
- NO ENTRY signs will be placed on each door.
- No one will be permitted to leave or enter the school until school Administration announces that Hold and Secure is over.

**Lockdown** will be activated if there is a *potential threat* <u>inside</u> the school building. If the school is in Lockdown, the following procedures will apply:

- All students and staff will proceed to the nearest classroom or office.
- All doors to classrooms and offices will be locked and/or barricaded by the supervising adult.
- Students will be kept away from windows and doors and instructed to remain silent and still.
- No one will be permitted to leave the room until Lockdown is over.

Effective September 1, 2015, all schools in RETSD are required to hold at least two Lockdown and one Hold and Secure practice drills each school year. The purpose of the drills is to provide training for staff and students so everyone knows what to do in the event of a safety threat. Everyone in the school building will participate in these drills. Students, staff and parents will be informed in advance of these practice drills.

If your son/daughter arrives at school during a Hold and Secure or Lockdown procedure, he or she must proceed to the school evacuation site, sign in and remain there until directed otherwise by administration or police. **The evacuation site for Westview School is Ecole Regent Park.** 

If you arrive at the school during a Hold and Secure or Lockdown, DO NOT ATTEMPT TO ENTER THE SCHOOL; instead, please proceed to the parent/guardian information site where divisional personnel will be available to assist you. **The parent information site for your son/daughter's school is Radisson School.** 

If you hear about a serious emergency at your son/daughter's school through media reports or other means, DO NOT PROCEED TO THE SCHOOL—please proceed to the parent information site identified above.

Please DO NOT CALL YOUR SON/DAUGHTER'S S CELL PHONE during an emergency, particularly in a Lockdown situation where it is critical to remain silent and still and not draw

attention from any threat makers that may be in the building.

If you have any questions about the procedures described above, please feel free to contact the school.

#### The Facts of Lice

Please remember that lice occurs in all schools and can happen to anyone. In the event that your child has lice, it is imperative that you contact the school and inform us of the classroom that your child is in so we can send notes home with all the students in that classroom.

At the school level, we are doing our best to be proactive as well. When a lice note is sent home, we are asking you to please check your child's head.

#### Here is what to look for:



#### Lice Info to share with your child:

- Head lice are spread by head-to-head contact with someone who has lice
- Do not share things that are in direct contact with a person's hair such as combs, brushes, barrettes, ribbons, hats, scarves, helmets, towels, pillows, and coats.
- Children ages 5 to 12 get lice more easily because their heads often touch when they play together.

# Parking/Stopping

The loading zone on Ravelston is now in effect 7 am—6 pm Monday through Friday all year long; there will be no parking/stopping on the side across from the loading zone for the same time period. The Parking Authority will be monitoring the new loading zone

and will be ticketing people who are parking incorrectly. Further to that, Winnipeg now has electronic ticketing vehicles that need only drive down the street to automatically ticket people and send it in the mail.

We would also ask parents and guardians to please refrain from using the staff parking lot for picking up and dropping off children.
