Welcome to the September 19<sup>th</sup> Wayoata School Community Council.




Students and staff have had a great 2.5 weeks here at Wayoata School. Staff were welcomed back on September 6th and students returned on September 7<sup>th</sup>.







# Literacy

PRIORITY #1: LITERACY

 Enhance student achievement through authentic and appropriate literacy instruction.

### RETSD Outcomes

By June 2023, students in Kindergarten to Grade 12 will become literate citizens who use language to communicate, comprehend and critically think. This will be reflected through multiple modes (print, digital, oral, written) that are drawn from multiple data sources (products, observations and conversations) that are student specific, strength based and ensure learning acceleration and evidence of growth over time.

By June 2023, students in Grade 4 will demonstrate increasing independence with a variety of texts as described in the Observing and Communicating Learning Growth section of the ELA curiculum.

By June 2023, students who are in the care of a child and family services agency in Grade 2 will be at the emerging stage of independence according to the ELA K-2 Grade band descriptors in both reading and writing.



# **Buisa-lleW**

PRIORITY #2: WELL-BEING

 Enhance the climate, culture and inclusivity in all schools through an authentic and appropriate comprehensive school health framework.

### **RETSD Outcomes**

By June 2023, students will be safe and caring citizens who are committed to respecting diversity, inclusivity, equity, and sustainability. This will be reflected through multiple modes (actions, decisions, beliefs) that are drawn from multiple data sources (products, observations, and conversations) that are student-specific, strength-based and ensure evidence of growth over time.

By June 2023, 100% of identified students in grades 4 and 5 will express feeling supported with their academics and well-being.

By June 2023, 100% of students who identify as Indigenous will demonstrate improved social and academic growth over the course of the year.

# Numeracy

### PRIORITY #3: NUMERACY

• Enhance student achievement through authentic and appropriate mathematics instruction.

### **RETSD Outcomes**

By June 2023, students in Kindergarten to Grade 12 will become numerate citizens who use mathematics with confidence, accuracy and efficiency. This will be reflected through multiple strands (Number sense, patterns/relationships, shape/space, statistics/probability) that are drawn from multiple data sources (products, observations and conversations) that are student specific, strength based and ensure learning acceleration and evidence of growth over time.

By June 2023, 75% of monitored Grade 1 students in ENIP will demonstrate proficiency in 10 of 10 benchmarks while those in the Early Numeracy pilot will demonstrate proficiency in 7 early numeracy competencies.

By June 2023, 60% of students on an individual education plan in grade 3 will have good or very good levels of mathematics as indicated by a 3 or 4 on the provincial report in all mathematics categories.

# At Wayoata School...


By June 2023, students will have good or very good levels of understanding of the ELA curriculum as indicated by 75% or more of the report card maks in all categories.

By June 2023, 78% of students in Kindergarten to Grade 5 will compute with increased accuracy (produce an accurate answer), efficiency (choose an appropriate, quick strategy), and flexibility (use number relationships with ease in computations).

By June 2023, children will understand the global impact of sustainability in the environment.

By June 2023, students will demonstrate a positive sense of belonging and acceptance towards diversity (cultural, religious, ability – both physical and neurological, sexual orientations, family, etc.), both the uniqueness and similarities within our school community.


By June 2023, students will become safe and caring citizens who are committed to promoting well-being, respecting themselves, our school and community.
